RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING CHARLES SCRIVEN ON HIS LONG AND DISTINGUISHED CAREER ΤN LAW ENFORCEMENT AS Α PIONEER AFRICAN-AMERICAN OFFICER IN THE JACKSONVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND THE CONSOLIDATED CITY'S SHERIFF'S OFFICE, AND AS A FLORIDA PAROLE COMMISSIONER; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Charles J. Scriven, a native of Jacksonville, graduated from Stanton High School, served in the US Army as a military policeman and as an investigator in the Provost Marshal's Office, and later earned his bachelor's degree in social science from Edward Waters College; and

WHEREAS, in 1955 Mr. Scriven joined the Jacksonville Police Department as one of its first African-American patrolmen in the "Negro Precinct", created as a result of a 1950 campaign promise by then-mayoral candidate Hayden Burns to integrate the city's police force. Officer Scriven was promoted to the rank of sergeant in 1960 and, after the City of Jacksonville and Duval County consolidated in 1968, became the first African-American officer to reach the rank of lieutenant in the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office; and

WHEREAS, in 1973 Lieutenant Scriven was promoted to the rank of Chief, the first African-American to achieve that rank in the Sheriff's Office, when he was appointed to lead the new Community Relations Division of the JSO, in which role he was one of the

founders of the Police Athletic League and led the effort to improve relations between law enforcement and the communities the department serves; and

WHEREAS, in 1974 Chief Scriven was appointed by Governor Reubin Askew as a member of the Florida Parole Commission and became its first African-American member and ultimately Chairman. In 1987 Mr. Scriven retired from the Parole Commission and joined the staff of the Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco, where he worked for another 17 year; and

WHEREAS, in addition to his long career in law enforcement, Charles Scriven was also a preacher and pastor, obtaining his license to preach in 1961 and serving as an associate minister for several churches before being called to his first pastorate at First African Baptist Church in St. Mary's, Georgia and ultimately to Corinth Christian Fellowship of Midway, Florida where he is pastor emeritus; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Scriven was a groundbreaker in many fields related to law enforcement and justice in Jacksonville and in the State of Florida, and his decades of service to others are worthy of recognition and commendation; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

The City of Jacksonville hereby honors commends Reverend Charles J. Scriven on his long and distinguished career in law enforcement and related fields, and for commitment to service and justice over the course of many decades. His legacy of leadership in many fields of endeavor are a source of inspiration to all who have had the honor to know and serve with him.

Effective Date. This Resolution shall become Section 2. effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
