RESOLUTION 2020-223

A RESOLUTION HONORING THE JACKSONVILLE CHAPTER OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION ON THE EVENT OF THEIR 125^{TH} ANNIVERSARY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, to honor their heritage and to perpetuate the memory of the men and women who achieved American independence, the Daughters of the American Revolution received the approval of the

President of the United States of America and was founded on

October 11, 1890 in Washington DC with the purpose of making a

difference in their communities across the country and the world. The organization is open to all women 18 years of age or older who

can prove a lineal descendent from a Patriot of the American

Revolution. By an Act of Congress, the Jacksonville Chapter formed

on April 3, 1895 with 18 members and is acknowledged as the first

Chapter of the DAR in the State of Florida and lovingly known as

the "Florida's Mother Chapter"; and

WHEREAS, in order to preserve the principles of the founders of our nation, all meetings open with the ritual of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, the National Anthem, the Preamble to the Constitution and the American's Creed; and

WHEREAS, in 1924 the Jacksonville Chapter, in support of international recognition of Jean Ribault as a leader of religious freedom, placed a memorial known as the Ribault Monument in Mayport, later moved to Ft. Caroline National Memorial. In 1928 the

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Jacksonville Chapter DAR placed a marker at the northeast corner of Hemming Park to highlight the convergence of the Apalachee Trail and the Kings Road leading into the Florida territory prior to statehood. In 1938 the Jacksonville Chapter placed a marker in the vicinity of Ft. George Island to honor French Huguenots who arrived at the Florida shore in search of religious freedom. This was the first historic marker placed by a DAR chapter in the State of Florida which led the way to innumerable DAR markers that followed; and

WHEREAS, in 1895 the Jacksonville Chapter sponsored the first applicant to the Florida Children of the American Revolution oldest nation's and largest patriotic the organization. Patriotism, Education and Historic Preservation are the focus of the Jacksonville Chapter and accordingly among its activities are the Wreaths Across America for National Cemeteries; scholarships in pursuit of American History degrees; recognition of American History teachers; awards of ROTC ribbons, medals and certificates; the presentation of Good Citizenship Awards Awards for Outstanding Service to the Community; recognition of high school students' patriotic essays; and participation naturalization services; and

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville Chapter continues a long-standing relationship with the local military, military veterans and the USO. Additionally, the Chapter presents flag retirement ceremonies and celebrates special patriotic days. On April 3, 2020, the Jacksonville Chapter of the National Daughters of the American Revolution Duval County, in the State of Florida, celebrated their 125th anniversary of non-profit, volunteer service to the community of Jacksonville; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City of Jacksonville hereby honors the

125th anniversary of the Jacksonville Chapter of the National Daughters of the American Revolution and commends the DAR members for their patriotism, commitment to historical education, and continuous service to our community.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
