## RESOLUTION 2020-224-W

A RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE PUBLIC SAFETY AND WELFARE OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC; STRONGLY ENCOURAGING ACTION BY BANKS AND FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS; STRONGLY ENCOURAGING ADDITIONAL STATE AND FEDERAL ACTION; ENCOURAGING THE FLORIDA SUPREME COURT TO CONTINUE TO EXTEND ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER REGARDING WRITS OF POSSESSION FOR EVICTION PROCEEDINGS; ENCOURAGING THE SHERIFF TO STAY ENFORCEMENT ON EVICTION ORDERS DURING STATE OF EMERGENCY; REQUESTING EMERGENCY PASSAGE UPON INTRODUCTION; PROVIDING DIRECTION LEGISLATIVE SERVICES TO CIRCULATE A COPY OF THE RESOLUTION UPON ADOPTION; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on March 1, 2020, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 20-51 directing the Florida Department of Health to issue a Public Health Emergency as a result of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 20-52 declaring a state of emergency for the entire State of Florida as a result of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Mayor Curry issued Emergency Proclamation 2020-001, which proclaimed and declared a public emergency in the City of Jacksonville posed by the COVID-19

pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, President Donald J. Trump and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") issued the "15 Days to Slow the Spread" guidance advising individuals to adopt far-reaching social distancing measures, such as working from home and avoiding gatherings of more than 10 people; and

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2020, the Mayor enacted Jacksonville Emergency Executive Order 2020-3, which required non-essential employees to work from home and implemented social distancing procedures for establishments where employees were required to be present; and

WHEREAS, the President extended the federal guidance concerning social distancing until April 30, 2020 and all Duval County schools extended home-based education through May 1, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on April 1, 2020, the Mayor enacted Emergency Executive Order 2020-5, closing all non-essential retail and commercial businesses within the Consolidated City (including the Beaches and Baldwin) and prohibiting any member of the public or employee from being physically present in any non-essential retail or commercial establishment;

WHEREAS, while such restrictions on business are necessary during a public health pandemic, the effect on small businesses, their employees, nonprofits, and those dependent upon business models which encourage social contact such as restaurants, clubs and tourism, has been catastrophic; and

WHEREAS, it is projected that approximately 222,000 Floridians applied for unemployment for the week ending March 28, which may be artificially low as it was widely reported that the state's online system which processes unemployment benefits continued to "crash" and fail as a result of the numerous surges by those who wanted to

file jobless claims; as a result, the Department of Economic Opportunity will soon start accepting paper applications for unemployment benefits; and

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, Congress passed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"), which included in the relief package a measure that placed a 120-day moratorium on evictions for tenants in federally financing housing and bars property owners from evicting tenants from a property with a federally backed mortgage loan for failure to pay rent; and

WHEREAS, on April 2, 2020, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 2020-94 which suspended and tolled the statute of limitations for a foreclosure action or an eviction action based on the failure to pay rent for 45 days (until May 17, 2020); and

WHEREAS, the eviction moratorium from the CARES Act is only a suspension of payments owed, meaning that rent payments for April, May, June and July will still be owed to the landlord later this year and the Governor's Executive Order 2020-94 does not relieve an individual's obligations to make mortgage and rent payments; and

WHEREAS, many Jacksonville residents are experiencing substantial losses of income as a result of business closures, the loss of wages, or layoffs related to COVID-19, hindering their ability to keep up with rent payments; and

WHEREAS, figures from the U.S. Census data suggests that around 44% of the population of Jacksonville are renters; and

WHEREAS, because homelessness can exacerbate vulnerability to COVID-19, it is necessary to take measures to preserve and increase housing security for Jacksonville residents; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Supreme Court has advised the State's clerks of court to stop issuing writs of possession, which is the final document in an eviction that police can use to remove a tenant until the end of May; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriffs of Hillsborough and Orange Counties and the Police Chief of Miami-Dade County announced that they will not enforce eviction orders; and

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WHEREAS, the Council determines that it will be necessary to address the broader, long-term economic impact of this health emergency, and it will be imperative for state and federal legislators, as well as banks and financial institutions, to take actions that cities do not have the authority to take, including mortgage moratoriums and forgiveness of rent and mortgage payments during the health emergency; and

WHEREAS, during this state of emergency for the COVID-19 pandemic, and in the interests of protecting the public health and preventing transmission of COVID-19, it is essential to avoid unnecessary displacement of residents and homelessness; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Strongly Encouraging action by Financial Institutions. The Jacksonville City Council hereby strongly encourages banks and financial institutions to suspend mortgage payments, foreclosures, and late fees for low-income homeowners and landlords, with immediate forgiveness, and requests that financial institutions consider urgently implementing mitigation programs such as those providing no interest or emergency forgivable loans and grants to small businesses and nonprofits within Jacksonville that are unable to meet rent, mortgage or other fixed operating costs.

Strongly encouraging additional Section 2. State and Federal Action. The Jacksonville City Council hereby requests and U.S. urges Florida State legislators and Senators and Representatives to enact comprehensive legislation to further protect residents, tenants, homeowners and small businesses from

the adverse health, safety and economic impacts of the COVID-19 emergency crisis. This may take the form of such programs that may create: i) a moratorium on mortgage foreclosures; ii) a moratorium on commercial rent increases; iii) direct assistance programs for rent and mortgage payments and other housing-related expenses such as utilities, property taxes, and insurance; iv) programs that suspend of rents and mortgages held by banks and financial institutions; v) emergency grant programs for small businesses and nonprofits; or vi) emergency programs that provide homes and expanded services for people experiencing homelessness.

Section 3. Encouraging the Florida Supreme Court to continue to extend its administrative order advising the State's Clerks of the Court to stop issuing writs of possession. In March, through an administrative order, the Florida Supreme Court advised the State's Clerks of the Court to stop issuing writs of possession in eviction proceedings until April 17. The Chief Justice on April 6, 2020 extended this administrative order until the end of May. The Council strongly encourages the Florida Supreme Court to continue to extend the time for such administrative order to comply with the Governor's Executive Order 2020-92.

Section 4. Encouraging the Sheriff to stay enforcement of eviction orders while Jacksonville is under a state of emergency due to COVID-19. The Sheriffs of Hillsborough and Orange Counties and the Police Chief of Miami-Dade County have thus far announced that their officers will not enforce eviction orders while the county is under a state of emergency. The Council hereby encourages Mike Williams, as Sheriff of the City of Jacksonville, to follow the same approach and to agree to stay enforcement of evictions orders while Jacksonville remains in a COVID-19 state of emergency and as long as the Governor's Executive Order 2020-92 is in force.

Section 5. Requesting emergency passage upon introduction

pursuant to Council Rule 4.901 Emergency. Emergency passage upon introduction of this legislation is requested. The nature of the emergency is that the spread of COVID-19 has concurrently increased business closures, the loss of wages, or layoffs for employees, and immediate action by the Council is required to offset the exponential economic impact and stress upon Jacksonville's citizens and small businesses that has resulted from the pandemic.

Section 6. Directions to Legislative Services to circulate upon adoption. The Council hereby directs Legislative Services upon adoption to transmit a copy of the resolution to Governor DeSantis, the Clerk of the Florida Supreme Court, members of the Duval Delegation, and to U.S. Senators Marco Rubio and Rick Scott, and to U.S. Representatives Al Lawson and John Rutherford, Sheriff Mike Williams and all banks and financial institutions that do business within the City of Jacksonville.

Section 7. Effective Date. This resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
