WHEREAS, as elsewhere in the country, the citizens and businesses of Duval County are suffering severe economic impacts stemming in part from national, state and local measures closing certain businesses, public schools, public beaches, imposing emergency work-at-home requirements and limiting public gatherings ("Emergency Measures") in an effort to slow the infection rate of COVID-19; and

ORDINANCE MAKING CERTAIN FINDINGS ΑN AND APPROPRIATING \$1,000,000 OF CARES ACT GRANT FUNDING RECEIVED FROM THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF TREASURY TO PROVIDE ONE-TIME GRANTS UP \$10,000 EACH TO SMALL BUSINESSES LOCATED DUVAL COUNTY WHICH WERE IMPACTED BY COVID-19 HAD TO TEMPORARILY CLOSE AFTER GOVERNOR AUTHORIZED PHASE 1 REOPENING ON MAY 2020 IN ORDER TO PERFORM SANITIZATION OR DEEP CLEANING MEASURES FOLLOWING EMPLOYEE OR CUSTOMER EXPOSURE TO COVID-19 SO THAT SMALL BUSINESS COULD REOPEN; PROVIDING FOR MONTHLY REPORTS TO CITY COUNCIL; PROVIDING FOR REVERTER OF UNSPENT FUNDS; REQUESTING THAT THE FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT OVERSEE THE GRANT PROCESS AND PROGRAM; REQUESTING EMERGENCY ONE CYCLE PASSAGE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on May 4, 2020, the State of Florida began its limited Phase 1 reopening of businesses pursuant to Governor DeSantis' Plan for Florida's Recovery; and

WHEREAS, since that time many local businesses have carefully planned and formulated procedures for reopening to the public which have included thorough cleaning guidelines as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and the use of masks and social distancing to keep the public safe while in those businesses; and

WHEREAS, unfortunately, since the state-wide reopening beginning on May 4th, several local businesses have had to close temporarily when employees have either tested positive for COVID-19 or when employees have come in contact with customers or other individuals who have tested positive for COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, in order to reopen a building or premises following such situation, many businesses have undertaken a heightened cleaning procedure to sanitize for the public and sometimes professional sanitization and cleaning companies are hired to perform the work to ensure that building or premises is sterile before reopening; and

WHEREAS, the costs upon small businesses to undergo such additional deep cleaning procedures can be quite extensive, especially when added to the correlating loss of income the business faces while the business is closed for deep cleaning and sanitization; and

WHEREAS, the City is mindful of the ongoing complications and business interruptions that local businesses have faced in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic and desires to use funds received from the federal government through the CARES Act to provide reimbursement of the costs of sanitization and cleaning of buildings and premises associated with COVID-19 outbreak closures, up to \$10,000 per small business, provided that receipts or other

corresponding documentation showing the expenditure of these costs by the small business and that is not subject to reimbursement through insurance, contribution, or other set off; and

WHEREAS, disbursement of the grant funds pursuant to the program outlined herein is intended to lessen the severe economic impacts of business disruptions caused as a direct result of the spread of the COVID-19 after small businesses have reopened pursuant to the State reopening schedule but then have had to close for deep cleaning and sanitization after employees or customers have tested positive with COVID-19; now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Findings. It is hereby ascertained, determined, found, and declared as follows:

- (a) The recitals set forth herein are true and correct.
- (b) By providing financial reimbursement for certain small businesses who have incurred costs of deep cleaning and sanitizing buildings or premises after the state-wide reopening on May 4, 2020 but had to close after an employee or customer tested positive with COVID-19, which caused additional business interruptions and expenses to the business, the program discussed herein (the "Program") is designed to benefit small businesses affected and will promote and further the public and municipal purposes of the City and serve to limit the severe economic impacts of COVID-19.
- (c) The Program is designed to provide rapid economic relief to small businesses who have suffered business interruptions as a result of deep cleaning and sanitization in order to maintain the viability of such businesses, thus maintaining the City's tax base and revenues.
- (d) The Program will provide economic relief to small businesses, thus encouraging ongoing compliance with the Emergency Measures and benefitting the health, safety and welfare of the

citizens of Duval County.

- (e) The provision of the City's assistance as identified herein is a necessary expenditure incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19, were not accounted for in the City's most recently approved budget, and will reimburse expenses incurred after May 4, 2020 and prior to November 1, 2020;
- (f) The public expenditures are appropriate to make the Program feasible and the City's assistance is reasonable and not excessive, taking into account the extent of the public benefits expected to be derived from the Program, and taking into account all other forms of assistance available.
- (g) The authorizations provided by this Ordinance are for public uses and purposes for which the City may use its powers as a county, municipality and as a political subdivision of the State of Florida and may expend public funds, and the necessity in the public interest for the provisions herein enacted is hereby declared as a matter of legislative determination.
- (h) This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the provisions of Chapters 163, 166 and 125, Florida Statutes, as amended, the City's Charter, and other applicable provisions of law.
- Section 2. Appropriation. For the 2019-2020 fiscal year, within the City's budget, there are hereby appropriated the indicated sum(s) from the account(s) listed in subsection (a) to the account(s) listed in subsection (b):
- (The account information is attached hereto as **Exhibit 1** and incorporated herein by this reference)

 - (c) Explanation of Appropriation:

The funding above is from the Federal CARES Act Grant Funding received by the City from the Federal Government pursuant to CARES Act. The funds will be used to provide financial assistance to Duval County small businesses that have experienced additional expenses due to deep cleaning and sanitizing after the state-wide reopening on May 4, 2020 and necessitated after employees or customers were exposed to COVID-19 and the business had to close temporarily to create a sterile environment for the business reopening.

Section 3. Purpose. The purpose of the appropriation in Section 2 is to provide one time grants up to \$10,000 each to eligible Duval County small businesses to reimburse them for expenses incurred after the state-wide reopening on May 4, 2020 for sanitization and deep cleaning undertaken and necessitated when employees or customers were exposed to COVID-19 and the business had to close temporarily to sterilize the building and premises.

Section 4. Reverter. Any funds that are not spent for the purposes set forth in this Ordinance by December 31, 2020 shall revert back to the account of origin.

Program approved. For a period from the Effective Date of this Ordinance until November 1, 2020, the City is authorized to award Reimbursement Assistance to eligible Duval County small businesses in a one-time grant of up \$10,000 to approved applicants in accordance with the criteria attached hereto as Exhibit 2 and incorporated herein reference. The program is designed to provide reimbursement of expenses to Duval County small businesses that experienced additional costs related to sanitizing and deep cleaning the building or premises after the state-wide reopening on May 4, 2020 and following an employee or customer testing positive

for COVID-19 causing the business to temporarily close while taking heightened measures to disinfect or sterilize the building or premises. The funds can be used for the costs associated with deep cleaning and sanitization of the building, by the business or a third party. The City will make a one-time payment of up to \$10,000 to approved applicants. The eligibility criteria include that an applicant: (i) must be a small business located in Duval County; expenses incurred from deep cleaning demonstrate sanitizing the building or premises after an employee or customer tested positive for COVID-19 causing the business to temporarily close after the state-wide reopening on May 4; (iii) the applying business must own the building or represent that the business is expenses responsible for the related to deep cleaning sanitizing the premises; and (iv) only one grant shall be administered for each small business per address.

Section 6. Oversight Department. The Finance and Administration Department shall provide oversight for the Program herein.

Section 7. Monthly Report. The Finance and Administration Department is required to make a report monthly to the City Council concerning the use of the funds authorized hereby for the Program, including the number of recipients and dollar amounts of the Grants.

Section 8. Requesting Emergency One Cycle Passage pursuant to Council Rule 4.901. Emergency one cycle passage of this legislation is requested. The nature of the emergency is that the Council Auditor's Office has identified additional CARES Act funding that must be used for COVID-19 purposes before December 31, 2020 and at the same time local small business owners have informed the Council that they have incurred significant additional costs from COVID-19 when they have had to deep clean and sanitize

properties after employees or customers have tested positive to COVID-19 and the business must temporarily close in order to disinfect or sterilize the building or premises. These business interruption costs, in addition to the other economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, are putting a severe strain on local small businesses. As such, it is urgent that the funds be appropriated and expended as soon as possible, so that maximum use of the funds can be made in accordance with CARES Act requirements.

Section 9. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
