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SPECIAL CONDITIONS

1. Requirements of the award; remedies for non-compliance or for materially false statements

The conditions of this award are material requirements of the award. Compliance with any assurances or certifications submitted by or on behalf of the recipient that relate to conduct during the period of performance also is a material requirement of this award.

By signing and accepting this award on behalf of the recipient, the authorized recipient official accepts all material requirements of the award, and specifically adopts, as if personally executed by the authorized recipient official, all assurances or certifications submitted by or on behalf of the recipient that relate to conduct during the period of performance.

Failure to comply with any one or more of these award requirements -- whether a condition set out in full below, a condition incorporated by reference below, or an assurance or certification related to conduct during the award period -- may result in the Office on Violence Against Women ("OVW") taking appropriate action with respect to the recipient and the award. 31. Confidentiality and information sharing

33. Policy for response to workplace-related incidents of sexual misconduct, domestic violence, and dating violence

The Director of OVW, upon a finding that there has been substantial failure by the recipient to comply with applicable laws, regulations, and/or the terms and conditions of the award or relevant solicitation, will terminate or suspend until the Director is satisfied that there is no longer such failure, all or part of the award, in accordance with the provisions of 28 C.F.R. Part 18, as applicable mutatis mutandis.

35. Semiannual and final performance progress report submission

The recipient agrees to submit semiannual performance progress reports that describe activities conducted during the reporting period, including program effectiveness measures. Reports must be submitted throughout the project period, even if no funds were spent and no activities were conducted in a given reporting period. Future awards may be withheld if reports are delinquent.

The information that must be collected and reported to OVW can be found in the reporting form associated with the grant program or initiative under which this award was made. Performance progress reports must be submitted within 30 days after the end of the reporting periods, which are January 1 - June 30 and July 1 - December 31. Recipients are required to submit their reports through the DOJ grants system, unless and until OVW issues updated instructions for report submission. The final report is due 90 days after the end of the project period and should be marked "final" in the Report Type field.

36. Quarterly financial status reports

The recipient agrees that it will submit quarterly financial status reports to OVW through the DOJ grants system using the SF 425 Federal Financial Report form (available for viewing at https://www.grants.gov/web/grants/forms/post-award-reporting-forms.html#sortby=1), not later than 30 days after the end of each calendar quarter. The final report shall be submitted not later than 90 days following the end of the award period.



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37. Program income

Program income, as defined by 2 C.F.R. 200.80, means gross income earned by the non-federal entity that is directly generated by a supported activity or earned as a result of the federal award during the period of performance. Without prior approval from OVW, program income must be deducted from total allowable costs to determine the net allowable costs. In order to add program income to the OVW award, the recipient must seek approval from its program manager via a budget modification Grant Adjustment Notice (GAN) prior to generating any program income. Any program income added to the federal award must be used to support activities that were approved in the budget and follow the conditions of the OVW award. Any program income approved via budget modification GAN must be reported in the recipient's quarterly Federal Financial Report SF-425 in accordance with the addition alternative. If the program income amount changes (increases or decreases) during the project period, it must be approved via a budget modification GAN by the end of the project period. If the budget modification is not submitted and approved, it could result in audit findings for the recipient.

38. FFATA reporting subawards and executive compensation

The recipient agrees to comply with applicable requirements to report first-tier subawards ("subgrants") of \$25,000 or more and, in certain circumstances, to report the names and total compensation of the five most highly compensated executives of the recipient and first-tier subrecipients of award funds. 39. Changes to MOU and/or IMOA

The recipient agrees to submit for OVW review and approval, via Grant Adjustment Notice (GAN), any anticipated addition of, removal of, or change in collaborating partner agencies or individuals who are signatories of the Memorandum of Understanding and, if applicable, the Internal Memorandum of Agreement.

Submission of all materials and publications

The recipient agrees to submit to OVW one copy of all materials and publications (written, web-based, audio-visual, or any other format) that are funded under this award not less than twenty days prior to distribution or public release. If the materials are found to be outside the scope of the program, or in some way to compromise victim safety, the recipient will need to revise the materials to address these concerns or the recipient will not be allowed to use award funds to support the development or distribution of the materials.

41. Publication disclaimer

The recipient agrees that all materials and publications (written, web-based, audio-visual, or any other format) resulting from award activities shall contain the following statement: "This project was supported by Grant No. awarded by the Office on Violence Against Women, U.S. Department of Justice. The opinions, findings, conclusions, and recommendations expressed in this publication/program/exhibition are those of the author(s) and do not necessarily reflect the views of the U.S. Department of Justice." The recipient also agrees to ensure that any subrecipient at any tier will comply with this condition.

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SPECIAL CONDITIONS

42. Copyrighted works

Pursuant to 2 C.F.R. 200.315(b), the recipient may copyright any work that is subject to copyright and was developed, or for which ownership was acquired, under this award. OVW reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use the work, in whole or in part (including in the creation of derivative works), for federal purposes, and to authorize others to do so.

OVW also reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, in whole or in part (including in the creation of derivative works), any work developed by a subrecipient ("subgrantee") of this award, for federal purposes, and to authorize others to do so.

In addition, the recipient (or subrecipient, contractor, or subcontractor of this award at any tier) must obtain advance written approval from the OVW program manager assigned to this award, and must comply with all conditions specified by the program manager in connection with that approval, before: 1) using award funds to purchase ownership of, or a license to use, a copyrighted work; or 2) incorporating any copyrighted work, or portion thereof, into a new work developed under this award.

It is the responsibility of the recipient (and of each subrecipient, contractor, or subcontractor as applicable) to ensure that this condition is included in any subaward, contract, or subcontract under this award.

Grantee orientation - mandatory attendance

First-time recipients, or continuation recipients if requested, must agree to have key staff members, as identified by OVW, attend the OVW grantee orientation seminar, which may be offered in-person, online, or a combination of both. Additionally, if there is a change in the project director/coordinator during the grant period, the recipient agrees, at the earliest opportunity, to send the new project director/coordinator, regardless of prior experience with this or any other federal award, to an in-person OVW grantee orientation seminar or require completion of the orientation online, whichever is available.

44. Prior approval for non-OVW sponsored technical assistance

The recipient agrees that funds allocated for OVW-sponsored technical assistance may not be used for any other purpose without prior approval by OVW. To request approval, the recipient must submit a Grant Adjustment Notice (GAN) and attach a copy of the event's brochure, a curriculum and/or agenda, a description of the hosts or trainers, and an estimated breakdown of costs. The GAN request must be submitted to OVW at least 20 days prior to registering for the event. Requests to attend non-OVW sponsored events will be considered on a case-by-case basis. This prior approval process also applies to requests for the use of OVW-designated technical assistance funds to pay a consultant or contractor not designated as an OVW technical assistance provider to develop and/or provide training and/or technical assistance.

45. Participation in OVW-sponsored technical assistance

The recipient agrees to attend and participate in OVW-sponsored technical assistance. Technical assistance includes, but is not limited to, national and regional conferences, audio conferences, webinars, peer-to-peer consultations, and workshops conducted by OVW-designated technical assistance providers.

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SPECIAL CONDITIONS

46. Consultant compensation rates

The recipient acknowledges that consultants paid with award funds generally may not be paid at a rate in excess of \$81.25 per hour, not to exceed \$650 per day. To exceed this specified maximum rate, recipients must submit to OVW a detailed justification and have such justification approved by OVW, prior to obligation or expenditure of such funds. Issuance of this award or approval of the award budget alone does not indicate approval of any consultant rate in excess of \$81.25 per hour, not to exceed \$650 per day. Although prior approval is not required for consultant rates below this specified maximum rate, recipients are required to maintain documentation to support all daily or hourly consultant rates.

47. Development of adequate security measures

The recipient agrees to institute measures designed to protect the safety of transitional housing program clients, including, but not limited to, providing personnel and procedures to enhance facility and individual security.

48. Limitation on use of funds for services for children

The recipient agrees that grant funds will not be used to provide direct services to children, including children who witness domestic violence or victims of child abuse, except where the child meets the program eligibility for transitional housing services or where such services are an ancillary part of providing transitional housing and supportive services to the child's parent (or legal guardian) who is a victim of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, or stalking.

49. Follow-up services

The recipient agrees to offer follow-up support services for a minimum of three months, and no more than 12 months, after a victim has secured permanent housing, such as case management, counseling, and other support services. These services will enhance the victim's ability to maintain permanent housing and successfully integrate into the community.

50. Length of stay in transitional housing

The recipient agrees that grant funds will be used to provide transitional housing assistance or short-term rental assistance for a minimum of 6 months and not more than 24 months. The recipient may waive this 24-month restriction for not more than an additional 6-month period if the participant has made a good-faith effort to acquire permanent housing and has been unable to do so. Additionally, participants may leave the program and then return to complete the 24-month maximum length of stay.

51. Limitation on use of funds for legal services

The recipient agrees that the use of grant funds for legal services will be limited to those legal services that are necessary for a victim of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and/or stalking to locate and secure permanent housing, and to integrate into a community, such as legal services regarding housing, protection orders, and limited immigration matters that may affect a victim's ability to obtain housing (such as U visas). Funds under this grant program may not be used for comprehensive, long-term legal assistance, such as divorce or child custody.



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SPECIAL CONDITIONS

52. Eligibility for transitional housing services

The recipient acknowledges that, under 34 U.S.C. § 12351(a), grants under this program may be used to provide transitional housing, or rental assistance, and supportive services only to survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and/or stalking and their children and dependents. Eligible to be served are survivors: (1) who are homeless, or in need of transitional housing or other housing assistance, as a result of a situation of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking; and (2) for whom emergency shelter services or other crisis intervention services are unavailable or insufficient.

53. Requirement that support services be provided only to transitional housing clients

The recipient agrees that grant-funded support services will be provided only to clients in transitional housing or who have exited transitional housing (clients offered transitional housing or rental assistance for at least 6 months and up to 24 months). The recipient further agrees that grant funds will not be used to support individuals who are not part of its transitional housing program.

54. Prohibition on use of grant funds for emergency shelter services

The recipient agrees not to use grant funds for emergency shelter costs and/or services that are not directly linked to the provision of transitional housing.

55. Voluntariness of support services

The recipient agrees that any support services, including, but not limited to, budgeting, counseling, and substance abuse treatment, available to and/or offered to participants of the recipient's program are voluntary. The recipient further agrees that participants will not be required to file criminal and/or civil charges. The recipient agrees that refusal to receive such services or file such charges will not be grounds for termination from its program or eviction from housing.

56. Required training on the provision of voluntary services

First-time recipients agree to send their key project staff to training with an OVW technical assistance provider on conducting effective programming with voluntary services within the first 12 months of the grant award. In addition, for all recipients, if there is a change in key project staff during the grant period, the recipient agrees to send the new key project staff, regardless of prior experience with this or any other federal grants, to the first available training on effective programming with voluntary services provided by an OVW technical assistance provider.

57. Requirements related to services for underserved populations

The recipient agrees that project activities providing services to underserved populations or communities will be developed and implemented in partnership with representatives of the affected communities and tailored to respond to the needs of victims in those specific communities. In addition, the recipient is required to obtain technical assistance on working with underserved communities from an OVW-designated technical assistance provider.

58. Prohibition on construction and building renovations

The recipient agrees that it will not allocate any grant funds for construction or building renovations, including seemingly minor renovations (such as painting or carpeting).

SPECIAL CONDITIONS

59. Limitation on use of funds for training

The recipient agrees that grant funds will be used for training of project partners only to enhance the quality of services provided under the grant.

60. Prohibition on imposing additional eligibility requirements for transitional housing services

The recipient agrees that it may not impose any requirements, other than those found at 34 U.S.C. § 12351(a)(1) & (2), on participants in its transitional housing program as conditions for entry into or continuation in the program (such as a requirement of employment, school enrollment, or a certain level of income). The recipient further agrees not to mandate participation in services as a requirement for entry into or continuation in its transitional housing program.

61. Limitation on use of funds to address family violence

The recipient acknowledges that grant funds may not be used to directly address child abuse or other family violence, such as violence between a parent and child or violence between siblings. Grant funds also may not be used for caregiver abuse of elders and other vulnerable adults unless the caregiver is the victim's intimate partner. These limitations do not apply to grant funds directed toward addressing sexual violence.

62. Prohibition on cash payments to victims

The recipient agrees that, although grant funds may be used to provide transitional housing assistance to eligible victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking, grant funds will not be used to make direct cash payments to such victims to assist them with their transitional living expenses.

63. Withholding of funds pending submission of transitional housing policies and procedures for review and approval

The recipient may not draw down funds in excess of \$10,000 (for travel-related expenses to attend OVW-sponsored technical assistance events) until the recipient has submitted the policies, procedures, and rules governing the provision of any transitional housing and related supportive services to OVW for review and approval, via Grant Adjustment Notice (GAN). These documents must include, at a minimum, those used for program eligibility, intake, working with participants, and providing other housing-related assistance, such as rent and utilities to transitional housing clients. The recipient agrees to work with OVW-sponsored technical assistance provider(s) to develop or enhance any rules, policies, and procedures that OVW determines, as a part of this review, are needed to reflect best practices for serving survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

64. Conditional clearance with release of TA funds

The recipient's budget is pending review and approval. The recipient may obligate, expend, and draw down only funds for travel-related expenses up to \$10,000 to attend OVW-sponsored technical assistance events, unless there is another condition on the award prohibiting obligation, expenditure, and drawdown of any funds, in which case the condition prohibiting any obligation, expenditure, or drawdown of funds will control. Remaining funds will not be available for drawdown until OVW's Grants Financial Management Division has approved the budget and budget narrative, and a Grant Adjustment Notice (GAN) has been issued removing this special condition. Any obligations or expenditures incurred by the recipient prior to the budget being approved are made at the recipient's own risk. If applicable, the Indirect Cost Rate will be identified in the GAN when the budget is approved.

Subject: Categorical Exclusion for City of Jacksonville

The Transitional Housing Assistance Grants for Victims of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking Program (Transitional Housing Program) is authorized by 34 U.S.C. § 12351. The primary purpose of the Transitional Housing Program is to provide aid to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking who are homeless, or in need of transitional housing or other housing assistance, as a result of their victimization, and for whom emergency shelter services or other crisis intervention services are unavailable or insufficient. The program supports holistic, victim-centered approaches to providing transitional housing and support services that move individuals into permanent housing and help them secure employment and integrate into a community.

Renovations and construction are unallowable under this grant, and therefore none of the following activities will be conducted under the OVW federal action (i.e., the OVW-funded grant project) or a related third-party action:

- 1. New construction.
- 2. Any renovation or remodeling of a property located in an environmentally or historically sensitive area, including property (a) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, or (b) located within a 100-year flood plain, a wetland, or habitat for an endangered species.
- 3. A renovation which will change the basic prior use of a facility or significantly change its size.
- 4. Research and technology whose anticipated and future application could be expected to have an effect on the environment.
- 5. Implementation of a program involving the use of chemicals.

In addition, the OVW federal action is neither a phase nor a segment of a project that, when reviewed in its entirety, would not meet the criteria for a categorical exclusion.

Consequently, the subject federal action meets the Office on Violence Against Women's criteria for a categorical exclusion as contained in paragraph 4(b) of Appendix D to Part 61 of Title 28 of the Code of Federal Regulations (adopted by OVW at 28 CFR § 0.122(b)). Also, no further analysis is required under the National Historic Preservation Act or other related statutes and regulations.
