RESOLUTION 2020-424-W

A RESOLUTION URGING THE DUVAL COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD TO CONSIDER MEMORIALIZING THE LATE EARL JOHNSON SR. FOR HIS LIFE'S WORK FOR THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT, HIS RECORD OF PUBLIC SERVICE WHICH EXTENDED STATE AND NATION WIDE, SERVICE THE CREATION AND ΙN OF CONSOLIDATED GOVERNMENT OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BY NAMING A SCHOOL FOR EARL M. JOHNSON SR.; DIRECTING THE LEGISLATIVE SERVICES DIVISION TO PROVIDE A COPY OF THE RESOLUTION, UPON ADOPTION, TO THE DUVAL COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD AND THE SUPERINTENDENT; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Earl M. Johnson Sr. was born in 1928, the son a railroad laborer in Huntington, West Virginia, and served in the U.S. Army during the Korean War; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Johnson graduated from Howard University School of Law in 1958, first in his class, having been tutored and mentored by the future Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Johnson moved to Jacksonville as a young civil rights attorney in 1958, becoming the first Black member of the Jacksonville Bar Association, and working with Civil Rights legends Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Andrew Young and Stetson Kennedy to end Jim Crow laws and segregation in the old core city of Jacksonville, the county of Duval, the State of Florida and the nation as a whole; and

-

WHEREAS, the late Earl M. Johnson Sr., litigated nearly all of the Florida school desegregation lawsuits, was an advisor to President John Kennedy, represented the first woman to have a work discrimination case heard before the U.S. Supreme Court, and was inducted into the Florida Civil Rights Hall of Fame in 2016; and

WHEREAS, Earl Johnson, by the mid-1960's, was expected to become Jacksonville's first Black Mayor, given the emerging majority Black electorate in the old core city in the mid-1960s; and

WHEREAS, Earl Johnson exemplified rare statesmanship and civic foresight by abandoning personal political ambition to address the dysfunction that existed in the old core city and the surrounding county government which had led to widespread neglect of neighborhoods, inefficient duplication of services, a loss of accreditation of the public school system, a shrinking tax base and public corruption; and

WHEREAS, Earl Johnson joined the campaign for consolidation and became secretary to the Local Government Study Commission in 1965 that led to consolidation, and in 1966 challenged the commission: "You must not only show consolidation is the best hope for the black community, you must show it's the best hope for the entire community"; and

WHEREAS, Earl Johnson's efforts led to most citizens of the old city and county governments, Black and White, voting for consolidation, and Mr. Johnson went on to serve on the first City Council of the newly consolidated City of Jacksonville as an Atlarge member of the Council from 1967-1983; and

WHEREAS, Earl Johnson was recognized by Council Resolution 83-642-171, as having provided 15 years of "strong and effective leadership" and "'through his quiet effectiveness' provided a foundation of informed professionalism throughout the somewhat

hectic years after consolidation to insure that the transition to the new form of government was sound and efficient" and as having been "a bridge between the races, between the rich and the poor and as a conscience for the council whose opinions and judgements were respected by all;" and

WHEREAS, the Council believes that Earl Johnson's personal commitment to service, ability and philosophical outlook contributed greatly to the betterment of all people of Jacksonville should be memorialized by naming a Duval County school in his honor; and

WHEREAS, the Duval County School Board at its June 16, 2020 meeting voted unanimously to rename six schools currently named after Confederate soldiers and is in the process of establishing a method to decide on a new name for each building with the community's input; and

WHEREAS, the Council urges the Duval County School Board to rename one of these six schools after Earl M. Johnson Sr.; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Urging the Duval County School Board to consider naming a school for the late Earl M. Johnson Sr. The City of Jacksonville hereby urges and encourages the Duval County School Board to memorialize the contributions of Earl M. Johnson Sr. to the City of Jacksonville and his historical accomplishments by renaming one of the six schools identified at the June 16, 2020 School Board meeting to be named after the late Earl M. Johnson Sr. recognizing his unselfish devotion to the harmony and prosperity of the City for all of its citizens, his contributions to the Civil Rights Movement and his dogged public service which impacted State and national laws and public policy for future generations.

Section 2. Direction to Circulate a copy of this

Resolution to the Duval County School Board and Superintendent Diane Greene. The Council hereby directs the Legislative Services Division to forward copies of this resolution, upon adoption, to the Duval County School Board and to Superintendent Diana Greene.

Section 3. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
