27 WHEREAS, in 1953 the field became part of history when it 28 became the location of the first games played by the newly 29 integrated Jacksonville Braves (a home team of the Milwaukee 30 Braves), which included three Black players, one of which was Henry 31 L. "Hank" Aaron; and WHEREAS, on January 22, 2021, the nation was saddened when
 Hank Aaron passed away at the age of 86; and

WHEREAS, a native of Alabama, Henry Louis Aaron, is regarded as one of the greatest baseball players of all time, having a storied career in professional baseball for more than 30 years and after retiring as a player held front office positions within the Atlanta Braves, becoming one of the first minorities in Major League Baseball upper-level management; and

9 WHEREAS, Aaron began his Major League Baseball career when he 10 was signed by the Boston Braves in 1952, and in 1953, the Braves 11 (which had then relocated to Milwaukee) promoted him from the Eau 12 Claire Bears (the Braves' Northern League Class-C farm team) to the 13 Jacksonville Braves, their Class-A affiliate in the South Atlantic 14 League; and

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville Braves won the league championship that same year and Aaron led the league in runs (115), hits (208), doubles (36), RBIs (125), total bases (338) and batting average (.362), and won the league's Most Valuable Player Award; and

WHEREAS, by 1954, Aaron was moving up within the ranks of the Milwaukee Braves and on April 13, he made his major league debut, and was swiftly nicknamed "Hammerin' Hank" by his teammates; and

22 WHEREAS, Aaron went on to play 23 seasons in Major League 23 Baseball, from 1954 through 1976; he spent 21 seasons with the 24 Braves in the National League and two season with the Milwaukee 25 Brewers in the American League; and

26 WHEREAS, Aaron had 755 career home runs, breaking the record 27 set by Babe Ruth; Aaron's record stood for 33 years until Barry 28 Bonds broke it in 2006; he still holds many other Major League 29 Baseball batting records to this day and was inducted into the 30 National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1982, his first year of 31 eligibility; and WHEREAS, the provisions of Section 122.105, Ordinance Code, for renaming as to the renaming of the ball field have been met; the public hearings have been held and the Planning and Development Department has submitted its report to the Council; and

5 WHEREAS, in recognition of the contributions of Henry L. 6 Aaron to the game of baseball and to Jacksonville's unique history, 7 it is fitting that the field located at J. P. Small Memorial Park 8 Stadium, where Aaron played as a member of the Jacksonville Braves, 9 be named in honor of Henry L. Aaron; now, therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

11 Section 1. The field at J. P. Small Memorial Park 12 Stadium, located at 1701 Myrtle Avenue, Jacksonville, Florida 32209 13 in District 8, is hereby named the "Henry L. Aaron Field at J. P. 14 Small Memorial Park Stadium" in recognition of Hank Aaron's 15 enduring imprint made on the game of baseball and the history of 16 Jacksonville.

17 Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall 18 become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming 19 effective without the Mayor's signature.
