WHEREAS, Lloyd N. Pearson, Jr., a native of Jacksonville, graduated from Old Stanton High and attended Edward Waters College before beginning a 35-year career at the U.S. Postal Service, following in the footsteps of his father Lloyd N. Pearson, Sr.; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Pearson had, and still has, a long and distinguished leadership role in America's struggle for civil rights. A stalwart of Jacksonville's branch of the NAACP, for many years he chaired voter registration drives that registered over 65,000 African Americans as voters, and personally registered over 35,000 of those new voters; and

WHEREAS, Lloyd Pearson was also a proponent of direct action to right wrongs and achieve justice. He organized and marched in many picket lines to protest segregation and overcome discriminatory employment practices in Jacksonville businesses and places of public accommodation. He participated in the famous March on Washington in 1963 and returned in 2013 to participate in the 50th anniversary of that seminal event in civil rights history; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Pearson, a father of 6 children, grandfather of 17 and great-grandfather of 27, is a firm believer in quality education
