## Presentation on Rebel Recovery Jax - Nikki Medina Rodriguez and Melissa Salazar

Nikki Medina Rodriguez, Director of Outreach of Rebel Recovery Florida, delivered a presentation to the committee about Rebel Recovery's work in assisting those struggling with substance abuse in the community. Ms. Rodriguez explained that Rebel Recovery is peer-led, meaning that those on its board have some history with substance abuse struggles, and provides low-barrier access, meaning that it attempts to make assistance to the targeted populations as easy as possible.

Ms. Rodriguez explained several programs run by Rebel Recovery, including a syringe exchange program designed to prevent overdoses and the spread of infectious and bloodborne illnesses such as HIV. Rebel Recovery also administers a Narcan distribution program. Duval County is designated an EHE (Ending the HIV Epidemic) County by the CDC, the only such county in Florida.

Ms. Rodriguez explained Rebel Recovery's ultimate goal to provide a full continuum of care to suffering populations and provided statistics explaining the impact of their Narcan distribution program.

CP Salem asked Ms. Rodriguez how Rebel Recovery is funded. Ms. Rodriguez explained that Lutheran Services Florida fully funds Rebel Recovery; the organization does not receive public funds.

CM Peluso commented that many of the businesses on Kings Street, including bars and restaurants, that distribute Narcan are within his district; he asked for clarification as to how Rebel Recovery coordinated with these businesses. Ms. Rodriguez explained that Rebel Recovery reaches out to these businesses, explains the community benefits of Narcan distribution, and offers these businesses to stock Narcan on-site. CM Peluso commended Rebel Recovery on their community involvement.

CM Peluso commented that critics of the program might comment that a syringe exchange program could result in increased syringe litter; Ms. Rodriguez cited a study done in Miami that resulted in an $11 \%$ decrease in syringe litter in the area.

CM Boylan commented that it is important that it is understood that Rebel Recovery currently receives no public funds, but it could in the future if the Council wishes to revisit previous discussions about assisting the organization.

CM Gay introduced CM Gay Amendment \#1 and CM Gay Amendment \#3.
CM Gay thanked other council members and the community for their participation in the crafting of both amendments and expressed his opinion that the two amendments will benefit the City. He explained CM Gay Amendment \#1, which requires that the Chief of Procurement ensure that the City leverage its tax-exempt status by utilizing owner-direct purchase programs on line items that reach or exceed $\$ 100,000$ or $\$ 10,000$ in JSEB set-aside contracts. The amendment allows the Chief to submit written justification to not utilize the program if he/she deems that the City's purchasing these supplies is not feasible, economical, or beneficial to the City's interests.

CP Salem stated that he believes this bill to be an example of compromise leading to a satisfactory legislative result. He thanked everyone for their work on the project and urged the committee to vote yes.

CM M. Carlucci asked Bill Delaney about the Mayoral administration's position on the bill, to which Mr. Delaney responded that the administration believes this bill to be a matter for the Council to decide.

CM M. Carlucci asked whether the owner-direct purchase program could pose problems with IRS compliance. Phillip Peterson of the Auditor's Office explained that because the City is directly purchasing items using its tax exempt status, it is in compliance with the IRS, and he explained that the bill was written in such a way to ensure compliance. CM M. Carlucci expressed support for the bill.

CM Lahnen stated that he is excited to support the bill.
The committee unanimously approved CM Gay Amendment \#1.
CM Gay explained CM Gay Amendment \#3, which requires that capital improvement projects of $\$ 7,000,000$ or more use local contractors in at least $40 \%$ of the initial award amount. The amendment gives the Chief of Procurement discretion to deem this local participation requirement not feasible, and in such circumstances the local participation threshold is decreased to $20 \%$. Surrounding counties are considered local for purposes of this bill, as long as the surrounding counties reciprocate local preference to Duval County in similar programs.

CM Gay explained that he has been in contact with the Northeast Florida Regional Council, and they are in support of this legislation.

CM Boylan invited Dustin Freeman, Chief of the Procurement Division, and Lawsikia Hodges of the General Counsel's Office to explain definitions and the history of the bill. Mr. Freeman explained what CM Amendment \#3 considered to be local, which includes Baker, Clay, Flagler, Nassau, St. Johns, Putnam, and Duval Counties. Ms. Hodges explained that former CM Cumber introduced the bill in January 2023, and CP Salem picked up the bill after her departure. She thanked all those involved for the hard work that went into the bill.

CM Boylan thanked Ms. Hodges and Jeff Clements, Chief of Research, for their hard work on the bill. CM M. Carlucci also thanked former CM Cumber for her role in introducing the bill.

CM Boylan explained that the bill will go into effect in February 2024, and reiterated CM M. Carlucci's gratitude to former CM Cumber.

CM Gay requested to be added as a co-sponsor.
CM J. Carlucci thanked everyone for their support of the bill, explained the importance of the bill to the community and to his family, and briefly explained the history of the bill. The building was originally occupied by what is now the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office but was converted to being the Florida Department of Law Enforcement's Northeast Regional Headquarters in 1984-85. The building was named the "Joseph A. Carlucci Building" in 1986 and was recognized by this name while occupied by the FDLE. However, the building has since been re-occupied by JSO, and the building no longer holds the distinction of the Joseph A. Carlucci name.

CM Peluso said that he understands and supports the re-naming of the building.
CM M. Carlucci expressed his support for the bill, stating that he was proud that this bill would be CM J. Carlucci's first bill and that CM J. Carlucci's grandparents would be proud of the bill's passing.

Phillip Peterson explained the amendment.
CM Boylan expressed his support for the bill.
CM M. Carlucci explained that Mayor Tanzler was a "knight in shining armor" for the City when it was in a time of crisis, mired by corruption. He realized at the Fiftieth Anniversary of Consolidation in Jacksonville that Mayor Tanzler's legacy should be more prominently showcased. Considering Mayor Tanzler's efforts to activate waterways utilization, having a marina bear his name is a fitting addition to his legacy.

CM Peluso expressed his support for the bill and commended Mayor Tanzler's efforts of waterways activation.

CM Clark-Murray expressed that in her studies of City history, she had never encountered any blemishes on Mayor Tanzler's record, despite the era generally being characterized by endemic corruption. She requested to be added as a co-sponsor and observed that a triathlon had recently swum in the river.

CM Clark-Murray explained the bill; the Council approved a sale of land to a private business in 2019 that was then in District 9 but, following 2023 redistricting, is now in District 7. She explained that this bill ensures that the money received through this 2019 acquisition would be used to maintain a park in the District near the location of the acquisition.

Phillip Peterson of the Auditor's Office explained the amendment, with the section of the amendment increasing City maximum indebtedness being struck from the amendment.

CM Boylan asked Mary Staffopoulos of the General Counsel's Office whether the Committee was in proper posture by voting on the amendment, striking the section about City indebtedness. Ms. Staffopoulos clarified that the Committee would be in proper posture voting on the amendment.

CM Peluso explained the history of his discussions with CM Clark-Murray on this bill, given that CM Peluso's district is the other district affected by this bill. He asked the Committee to support the bill.

Mia Hobdy, Director of New Town Success Zone, spoke in support of the bill. She explained that this community has been affected by recent tragedy and that the children of the community deserve a safe place to play.

Krista Fogarty of the Planning and Development Department spoke on both 2023-0739 and 2023-0740. She explained the process of a Brownfield designation and remediation.

CM Clark-Murray asked whether the City could be held liable if unexpected costs were to arise in the remediation process; Ms. Fogarty explained that the City would not be the responsible party. The City does not own land designated as Brownfield sites, but property owners seeking this designation must get Council approval.

Jason Teal of the General Counsel's Office explained that the property owners could be reimbursed by the state through the Brownfield remediation process, but the City does not become the legally responsible party through approving that property owners seek Brownfield designation.

Travis Jeffrey of the Housing and Community Development Division introduced Barney Smith, Board Chair of JHFA to talk about the legislation.

Mr. Smith explained that this bill allows the JHFA to apply for additional bond capacity for single-family homes. The state establishes private activity bond allocation caps for various regions of the state, and JHFA can apply to receive unused funds from other regions' caps but needs Council approval in order to do so. Jacksonville has a bond capacity this year of about $\$ 59.7$ million, and this bill allows the JHFA to apply for up to $\$ 100$ million more in bond capacity from unused funds from elsewhere in the state. The JHFA has given out about $\$ 116$ million in single-family housing bonds given out the past decade.

CM Peluso asked why this bill specifically focused on single-family housing rather than multi-family housing. Mr. Smith explained that JHFA has over $\$ 200$ million in current bond capacity, much of which is available for multi-family housing.

CM M. Carlucci reminded the Committee that the JFHA was originally a creation of the City Council, not of the mayoral administration.

CM Clark-Murray asked if there is data available that tracks minority involvement in JFHA programs, and Mr. Smith responded that there is and that he could get his data to the Committee.

CM Boylan asked what the income maximum for the down payment assistance program was, and Mr. Smith responded that two-person households earning $\$ 95,000$ or less were eligible, and that three-or-more-person households earning $\$ 110,000$ or less were eligible. CM Boylan observed that more people should be taking advantage of this program.

CM M. Carlucci stated that there have been many questions from constituents about various issues regarding this property, including whether it was a Brownfield environmental rehabilitation site and about the specifics of the planned use of the property.

Renee Hunter of Public Works explained that the medical examiner is not planning to use this property as a "morgue," and instead the building originally planned by the owner of the property to be used as a liquor store will be developed into a community center. She stated that the property is designated as a Brownfield site, as the property was at one point a gas station. However, all traces of petroleum have been removed from the property, and the state is responsible for the financing of the environmental rehabilitation.

CM M. Carlucci observed that the process of deciding how to use this property has been contentious and stated that he believes that the status of this property should be explained in public hearing before the full Council. Bill Delaney, Council Liaison of the Mayoral Administration, explained that he would be happy to give such an explanation.

CM Boylan said that the medical examiner's use of the property could bring job opportunities to the area.

CM Clark-Murray stated that this situation is why the Planning Commission is important; the Planning Commission did not listen to the community's desire originally regarding the planned use for the liquor store.

CM Gay agreed with CM Clark-Murray that the proposed liquor store was in neglect of the constituency's will, and he questioned why it was the City's responsibility to buy the property as a result of these past mistakes.

Ms. Hunter explained that the state is paying for the environmental rehabilitation of the site. Mr. Delaney stated that the City is paying for the original mistake in the liquor store planned use, but this deal before the Committee is the one that is on the table.
