Chairman Howland convened the meeting and the attendees introduced themselves for the record. Council President Ron Salem announced that the Council Auditor's Office is performing a financial analysis of UF Health Jacksonville and said he will be holding a briefing meeting for the council to hear the results of that analysis in the near future.

Mr. Howland announced that item #22, 2023-881, will be taken up first followed by the rest of the agenda in order.

Chairman Howland said he is greatly troubled by the removal of the Memorial to the Women of the Southland statues from Springfield Park and the General Counsel's unsigned opinion finding that the Mayor could order that action to be taken without the Council's consent. He said the Charter and Ordinance Code give the Council the ability to control the city's finances and a strong mayor can't do anything she wants without council authority. He called on former City General Counsels to provide their input on the recent unsigned legal opinion.

Council Secretary Peggy Sidman described the new equipment installed in the Council Chamber and said that IT staff are in attendance to help with any problems that may arise during the meeting.

Public Commnet

Carnell Oliver said 2023-860 is important legislation and noted that there is very little money left in the Northwest Economic Development Fund. He recommended devoting a percentage of the annual millage revenue to that fund. The council needs to make more investments in education and economic development in underserved communities rather than supporting the non-profit community.

Council Auditor Presentation: Report #873: Quarterly Summary for the Twelve Months Ended September 30, 2023

Council Auditor Kim Taylor said the City's books closed a few days late and last-minute adjustments are still being made. The report shows a net \$1.9M negative revenue variance in the General Fund and a \$75.4M positive variance in expenditures, so the overall net is a \$73.4 positive variance for the General Fund for the year. She noted a pending ordinance to move \$20M to the City's emergency reserve to meet the higher target for that fund which is being raised by another pending ordinance and said the FY23-24 budget used \$20M of FY21-22 fund balance as a revenue source for this year's budget. She said the City ended FY21-22 year with \$316M of operating reserves. Emergency reserves stand at about \$100M.

Regarding the independent agencies, Ms. Taylor said the JEA will have budget amendments to file via legislation to reflect a transfer of funds from a reserve account to cover Plant Vogtle-related expenses and \$93M in additional capital expenditures. JTA had 3 areas of its operations expend in excess of budget by a total of \$2.2M so it will also need to file an amendment for Council approval. JPA is anticipating a \$13.5M surplus and JAA will also experience a year-end surplus as a result of the JIA Concourse B construction project not being started in 2023 as expected.

President Salem said he understands that CM Boylan is planning to introduce legislation to appropriate \$10M in Sheriff's Office budget savings to jail maintenance and capital improvement projects in order to deal with immediate issues identified by the Special Committee on JSO Primary Facilities while planning for a new jail takes place. He also noted the pending legislation to increase the City's emergency reserve account funding target to 7-10% of the General Fund budget.

Phillip Peterson explained the request for the emergency. CM Carrico asked about the proposed uses of the funds. Joe Johnson, ECA for the bill's sponsor - CM Amaro - said that it will be used for items like palm tree trimming (not supported by the Public Works Department) and blight remediation, and could still be used for traffic calming if a specific need arises. Kim Taylor said that Public Works' funding for trees is prioritized for safety purposes, not aesthetics, so this allocation would fund that sort of work. In response to a question from CM Arias, Public Works Director Nina Sickler said there is approximately \$11M appropriated in the current budget specifically for extra mowing cycles and litter pickup which is now under contract for those specific uses. Mr. Arias recommended that changes be made to Public Works' policies to make this type of expenditure for aesthetic purposes possible. CM Gaffney, Jr. asked for clarification about the source of the funds and the intended uses. CM Lahnen said there is a need for more palm tree trimming that is frequently requested by constituents. Ms. Sickler said there is not currently a policy regarding tree trimming for aesthetic purposes. She cautioned against spending available tree funds for aesthetic trimming early in the fiscal year before the tropical storm season hits later in the summer when there may be a great need for that funding to deal with storm aftermath.

CM Arias explained the reason for the emergency and the bad traffic situation that needs to be addressed. He said the neighborhood's homeowner association will contribute funds to pay for JSO off-duty officers when the City funding allocation runs out. Phillip Peterson explained the amendment which was approved. In response to a question from CM Pittman, CM Arias described the hours the officers will be on duty. JSO Chief Ellis Burns described the operation of the secondary employment program and how officers will be scheduled and paid through a third-party contractor, not through the JSO budget. CMs Carrico, Gaffney, Jr., Pittman and Howland asked to be added as co-sponsors. Mr. Peterson said that there are still some outstanding legal issues regarding the use of off-duty JSO officers and their collective bargaining agreement. More discussion will need to take place with Employee Services and the OGC to iron out these issues. CMs Carrico and Howland thanked the Council President for his use of the President's Contingency to assist district council members in solving problems.

Municipal Code Enforcement Division report on lien and fine settlements and cancellations

The committee received a report as required by the Ordinance Code from the Municipal Code Enforcement Division reporting the settlement and cancellations of administrative fines and liens during FY22-23. The committee voted to formally accept the report as presented.

City Council Strategic Planning Process

Chairman Howland said the City Council Strategic Planning Process will proceed with the adoption of a proposed list of Council priorities for FY24-25 at the February 6th Finance Committee meeting for introduction as a resolution for consideration by the full Council at the next council meeting. Council members will receive a memo outlining the priority suggestion process and are invited to submit items for consideration. CM Carrico asked if the proposals should be district-specific or city-wide priorities; Mr. Howland said both are acceptable. He said that the amount of funding available is \$8.8M, with \$5M being allocated to a CIP reserve fund for downtown capital projects and \$3.8M available for allocation by the council (\$200,000 per council member). Proposals should be submitted on the request form provided to Mary Staffopoulos in the Office of General Counsel and to Council Auditor Kim Taylor by noon on January 25th. Council members can have noticed meetings before that date to talk about potential shared projects and priorities.
