Council Auditor Kyle Billy to discuss: Report #826 - MPS Redevelopment Agreement Audit

Mr. Billy said that the 2004 MPS agreement to provide garages for the sports complex and new courthouse is a public/private partnership - the City issued debt to build the garages, MPS operates the facilities, and the City loans MPS money if their operational revenues don't cover expenses. As of December 31, 2017 the City had paid \$47 million in principal and \$9.9 million in interest on the bonds. The bonds will be paid off in 2031, after which the City starts getting repaid by MPS for the subsidies. The audit found that overall the contract is being properly administered and payments are being calculated and paid correctly. However the DIA doesn't have any SOPs for monitoring this contract and apparently the DIA's contract monitors are not reviewing the data thoroughly enough, as math errors were found in the calculations. Documentation was not being submitted by MPS timely or in proper format. Reports were not being submitted monthly as required and the annual financial reports were submitted late. City payments to MPS were not made within 40 days as required. The audit found that the number of spaces in the garages don't match the contract specifications, probably due to re-striping. The audit found that MPS has not been paying its property taxes on time, which accrues penalties and interest that the City then must cover in the operating expenses subsidy (\$480,990 cumulatively).

Council Member DeFoor said it seemed that some of these items would constitute default on the contract and asked if legal remedies are being explored. In response to a question from Council Member Salem about whether this is the first audit of the contract and why it isn't being periodically reviewed, Mr. Billy explained that his office chooses audit subjects via a risk assessment mechanism and this contract finally rose to a level that merited the audit. The City has a contract manager who's supposed to be keeping an eye on contract compliance. Mr. Salem felt that the Office of General Counsel needs to take action against MPS to recoup the late fees and penalties on property tax payments that got incorporated into the City's subsidy. He is interested in knowing if there is an estimate of when will the courthouse garage go cash-positive and wanted to hear the plan for the future of these garages and their full utilization. Chairman Bowman said he will invite the DIA to a future meeting to discuss the garages and the contract.

In response to a question from Council Member Hazouri about whether MPS is a local company, Mr. Billy said that company management is located in Ohio. Mr. Hazouri had questions about whether MPS has an obligation in the contract to actively promote the garages and whether income from the retail spaces on the ground floor is included in the contractual revenue stream (it is). He would like to know if there are legal avenues to force action on the part of MPS or to end the contract. Deputy General Counsel Peggy Sidman said that the DIA oversees downtown parking so they will need to be a part of the solution. She offered to meet with DIA and Mayor's Office to explore these issues.

Council Member Pittman felt that the City needs a policy or mechanism (such as a checklist) for following up on contract performance; fiduciary responsibility needs to be exercised and that takes appropriate infrastructure. Council Member Salem suggested that if the City is subsidizing losses in garage operations, then MPS has no incentive to be proactive and hustle to improve occupancy rates. Council Member DeFoor reiterated the need to explore contract default provisions and see if the City could get ownership of those garages. Chairman Bowman asked Mr. Billy for a report segmenting the \$480,990 into late fees, penalty, and interest charges.

Council Member Ferraro gave background on the Shad Creek bank erosion and dock damage following the raising of a bridge which had the result of increasing boat traffic. Assistant General Counsel Susan Grandin explained state speed restriction regulations through the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission, which can establish "Boating restricted areas" with slow speed/no wake signage. She explained the proposed substitute. Council Member Pittman said that there are other water bodies in the city that need this kind of speed restriction protection. Mr. Ferraro said the Jacksonville Waterways Commission, which he chairs, will discuss it, but doesn't want to over-regulate speed zones where they're not really needed. Ms. Grandin said the Waterways Commission could do a study citywide. In response to a question she said that the funds being appropriated in this bill come from a Florida Inland Navigation District Boater Improvement Grant (BIG) and that the General Fund could could be another source for such signage. Council Member Salem asked about the enforcement process for these zones. Mr. Ferraro said that law enforcement can't do anything without signage first being posted. Council Member Hazouri felt that speed zones need to be targeted and based on established criteria, not done ad hoc based on complaints. Assistant Council Auditor Kim Taylor said the City currently has \$49,000 available in its BIG fund. Council Member DeFoor said the City needs to deal with derelict boats and improving our waterway system, which is the city's greatest asset.

Daryl Joseph, Director of the Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department, said that the City would be absorbing approximately \$65,000 annually in utility costs, plus \$10-15,000 for annual inspections. PAL will be responsible for handling routine maintenance. Keisha Burton (PAL) said the building needs expensive capital improvements and PAL can't afford it. Council Member DeFoor asked if there is a process for dealing with surplus vehicles other than ad hoc legislation. Chairman Bowman said the administration sees the need and is working on developing a policy. Jordan Elsbury clarified that there are currently surplus vehicle policies in place but Council is waiving the Code and those policies to do these special directive bills. The administration Is looking at doing something like a Public Service Grant grant application process when vehicles are requested by outside entities. Deputy General Counsel Peggy Sidman explained the current regulations. Surpus vehicles are offered for other uses in the City government, then unclaimed items are sold as surplus. Bills such as this one waive the sale requirement and make a no-cost donation.Council Member Ferraro wants to work on a policy for dealing with this kind of request in the future. He advocated for this specific surplus due to the nature of the recipient organization and the services it provides to the community. Council Member Freeman asked how council members can get the list of available surplus vehicles. Ms. Sidman gave a brief history of vehicle surplusing in Jacksonville; a former Council committee came up with the current policy for directing surplus vehicles to particular agencies. She said the Council didn't do directed surplusing for a number of years, but has recently re-started the practice.

Council Member Hazouri asked if there is a policy or process for how to refer to confidential economic development incentive applicants when there is open speculation in the media about who the company is and when some public officials seem to know the identity of the company. Chairman Bowman said the the Florida Statutes allow confidentiality until a deal is finalized and approved. Companies may want that confidentiality for a number of reasons, including competing cities, competitive advantage reasons with regard to other companies, impact on stock price, and the potential impact on employees. Mr. Hazouri noted that economic development competition among cities is fierce and that other jurisdictions often make large cash offers, which Jacksonville does not do.

At the end of the meeting the committe discussed the proposed school district local option sales tax for capital projects referendum. Chairman Bowman expressed thanks to all council members who posed questions to the School Board and said that it is the Council's job to protect the community's finances. He is disappointed in the answers received from the board, which didn't directly address what he wanted to know in some cases. He is looking for a binding legal opinion next week from the General Counsel that will go to Florida Attorney General for a definitive ruling on Council's role in the referendum process.

Council Member Salem said he's interested in broad-based issues and in establishing a monitoring committee. He's still unsure from the school district's response how the plan will be changed in the future as conditions change (finances, enrollment, etc.). Who will make changes in the plan – the Schoo Board, the Superintendent or the Monitoring Committee? Council Member Cumber said that all the questions that were posed were legitimate and the School Board should have asked all of them itself. She is looking forward to the joint meeting with the School Board and more specific answers to very specific questions.

Council Member Ferraro said agrees with everyone else that the questions weren't taken seriously by the school district. He conveyed questions that his constituents have been asking him and they deserve serious consideration and not dismissal as being "stupid" questions. Council Member Hazouri said that City Council has a responsibility to debate and vote on bills that come before it and not be a rubber stamp. The November 2020 ballot will be very crowded if this issue and a JEA sale referendum go on a Presidential election ballot. He wondered if there will there be organized, funded opposition against the tax. He said he hopes the joint meeting next week will solve lots of questions, but at some point the Council will have to stop asking questions and just vote on the issue. There are lots of tough decisions looming (Lot J incentives, JEA sale, Landing redevelopment, etc.) and Council will get a black eye if it delays this issue too long. Council Member Pittman said there are still lots of unanswered questions and a clear plan is needed that works for everyone. Her district faces a lot of school closures and some people are unhappy about what will happen to their communities if that happens. It's a very emotional issue with big impacts for people and communities. Council Member DeFoor expressed disappointment that the School Board didn't prepare well enough in advance to make it an easy decision for City Council to approve the referendum. From a business perspective, the school plan is insufficient and doesn't address all needs around the community. Council Member Hazouri announced that a notice "sunshine" meeting on the referendum bill will be held today at 3 p.m. with Council Member Priestly Jackson and anyone else who is interested to talk about the referendum. Council Member Freeman said that he's talked with lots and lots of parents and students and feels like the issue is getting too emotional and pitting one elected body against another, which is detrimental to everyone. Everyone is in favor of dealing with the needs of students, but need to get egos out of the way and deal with each other from a position of mutual respect. The best interests of the community as a whole need to take precedence over individual feelings.

Public Comment

Stanley Scott said the African American Economic Recovery Think Tank has developed a plan for fighting crime in the community and presented it to City Council but received almost no response from anyone. The Council seems unconcerned with the hundreds of deaths the community has suffered over the past 5 years. His organization is active on the ground and their plan deserves consideration.

Ashley Smith Juarez (School Board member) said the School Board sent its referendum proposal in May and still not gotten final action from City Council. The board members and superintendent have attended many meetings at City Hall and have not been given the opportunity to present answers to the questions being posed by the Council. They want to move the process forward and to overcome the communication disconnects with Council. All participants need to get serious and get the job done together.

Henry Rogers said his daughter lives in a flood zone and will benefit from 2019-525 which is on the agenda for 2nd reading today.

Michael Anderson said he supports the sales tax referendum in November 2019; the School Board has done its due diligence and held over 20 community meetings which city council members did not attend. Charter school advocates seem to be running the show in this debate.
