Council Auditor Kyle Billy to discuss Report #829: Quarterly Summary for the Twelve Months Ended September 30, 2019

Mr. Billy said the report showed a positive variance in General Fund revenue of \$19.6 million, largely the result of a positive variance of \$7.1 million in ad valorem tax collections, \$5.1 million of interest income and \$3.4 million of public safety ambulance transport revenues. The report also showed a positive variance in expenditures of \$12.6 million, primarily due to \$4.7 million in commercial paper interest savings, \$1.5 million in the Public Works budget, \$1.2 million in the Finance and Administration budget, and \$1 million in the Office of the Sheriff. The total favorable balance is \$32.2 million. In response to a question from Chairman Bowman, Mr. Billy noted that \$32.2 million is a fairly large positive variance and said he would bring the committee a 10-year report on past year-end variances. In response to a question from Council Member Salem, Mr. Billy said that these funds are available to fill deficit accounts from last year's budget and the remainder is placed in a reserve fund for reallocation. Council Member DeFoor suggested that some of the available balance be allocated on a council district basis to address local problems. Council Member Hazouri asked about the percentage increase in the local option half cent sales tax revenues over budget; Mr. Billy will research that number. Mr. Hazouri also asked for a figure on collections of property taxes previously in arrears. Mr. Billy also clarified that the positive variances are in operating funds, not related to capital projects.

Mr. Billy reviewed the City's progress on receiving reimbursements from the Federal Emergency Management Agency for damages sustained in Hurricanes Irma and Matthew. For Irma the City has appropriated \$8.8 million to deal with Irma damages, \$5 million over its anticipated final responsibility. Hurricane expenditures are segregated into separate funds for tracking purposes and city expenditures are reimbursed as FEMA funding is received. City officials will be meeting this Thursday with state officials about the timing of reimbursements for the hurricane damages. CFO Joey Greive said that a majority of the \$8 million still pending from Hurricane Irma is for Jax Beach pier repairs, which are ongoing. Council Member Cumber asked about the time lag between FEMA certification and state reimbursement of costs and about how Jacksonville's experience stacks up with other cities and counties in the state. Mr. Greive said that Jacksonville's experience is similar to other Florida jurisdictions; every jurisdiction is awaiting reimbursement from the state. A large part of the delay is due to the fact that Florida's state government requires a 100% review of all reimbursement documentation after it has already been 100% reviewed by FEMA. Other states do not have that level of state review of documentation after FEMA has completed its review. Also, the tremendous damage caused in the Florida panhandle by Hurricane Michael has diverted time and attention from review of reimbursement documentation to dealing with that later disaster.

In response to a question from Council Member Salem, Mr. Billy said that Jacksonville has very healthy reserve funds, which have been increased substantially over the past few years, to provide a buffer in the event of future storm-related expenditures. Council Member Hazouri asked about the previous allocation of \$8 million to the pier and whether the City is starting over on that project with new funding from the second hurricane. Mr. Greive said that the original funds are being spent on design and engineering and are available to pay for construction when that starts. Council Member DeFoor asked about the difference between what the City submitted for reimbursement versus what FEMA certifies and questioned if the City is sure we're going to get that back. Mr. Billy said that reimbursement is always considered contingent until the City actually gets the money back. Mr. Greive said that the Hurricane Irma reimbursement is taking longer than for Matthew, in part because of the devastating Hurricane Michael in the Florida panhandle that diverted FEMA and state attention to that crisis. He explained the process of submitting different tranches of documentation for different types of damages. Council Member DeFoor asked about the process of state review and requests for further documentation of what FEMA has already approved. Mr. Greive said Jacksonville would have a big problem if the state refused to certify some amounts and tried to keep the FEMA funds. The City has hired the accounting firm of Ernst and Young to help with good documentation. In response to a question from Council Member Pittman about FEMA reimbursement funds potentially being used for studies of flood-prone areas, Mr. Greive said that FEMA does have funding for protective measures and he and Chief of Emergency Preparedness Steve Woodard can help her explore that opportunity.

Kids Hope Alliance - Service Provision RFP Presentation

Donnie Horner III, Acting CEO of the KHA, said that the KHA board and staff have heard loud and clear the City Council's and community's sentiment that everyone wants to have more input into the KHA's RFP process for its services contracts. Dr. Saralyn Grass of the KHA described the 2020-21 Out of School Time RFP development process and the task force that led the process. Four focus groups were employed to develop program requirements and consider changes to the previous RFP. The new process will require less paper, will offer more time to respond, and will be more flexible about match requirements. Billing will be simplified, the cost per child will be increased from \$1600 to \$1865, and providers will be reimbursed on an hourly service unit rather than half-hours. Dr. Grass reviewed the minimum requirements for RFP eligibility, the program design requirements, staff training requirements, monthly deliverables for reimbursement, and performance measures.

Council Member Cumber asked about the flexible match and how much is required of the providers versus the City, particularly in the area of in-kind matches. She also asked for a fuller explanation of the full hour vs. less than full hour reimbursements, which Dr. Grass described. In response to a question from Council Member Salem about what percentage of students served at Duval County Public Schools versus charter schools, Dr. Grass said the KHA can't fund the schools directly but the schools partner with other providers (Boys and Girls Club, etc.) to provide programs on their campuses. KHA works with the schools to determine where the real need is, not just Title 1 areas. They know the need is bigger than what is currently being provided. Council Member Freeman asked to meet offline with KHA staff to ask detailed questions and asked to be included in any future discussions held with council members. He asked if the City has staffing in place to fully operate the program so providers aren't left holding non-reimbursable costs and was told they do. In response to a question from Council Members Hazouri about whether KHA has data on how many children from each school are participating in the programs and whether they graduate or not, Ms. Grass said KHA only get aggregate data from DCPS currently, but starting in the fall the KHA will become a research partner with DCPS and will get access to specific student data as long as it's not individually identifiable. Mr. Hazouri wants to see more evidence of what's actually happening with the dollars being provided and that providers are truly performing.

Chief Powers described the City's future responsibility to pick up the salaries for these new firefighters (25% match first 2 years, 75% third year, 100% thereafter). The National Fire Protection Association recommends 4-person companies on all apparatus, Jacksonville currently staffs at 3; this grant will help get Jacksonville up to the recommended standard. Chief Powers described how the positions would go away via attrition if the City did not pick up full funding in the future. In response to a question from Chairman Bowman about the department's ability to recruit in the current low unemployment environment, Chief Powers said it's hard to get enough quality applicants and they're recruiting hard.

Strategic Plan discussion

Chairman Bowman reviewed the development of the strategic plan and last year's \$5 million allocation in the budget for strategic plan priorities, and said that the plan is to do the same thing this year. He distributed a draft resolution and reviewed the draft legislation with 1-, 3- and 5-year goals. The committee will decide what items to request in next year's \$5 million allocation, which don't necessarily have to be from the strategic plan.

Council Member Salem suggested adding the infant mortality issue as a priority. Faye Johnson, CEO of the Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition, said her organization is working with Florida Blue and Baptist Medical Center on the social determinants of health that impact on infant mortality in order to create a one-stop shop for pregnant women to get them needed services to improve birth outcomes. Mr. Bowman said he thinks the Finance Committee has the authority to add additional items if it sees fit. The committee agreed to add an item to the 3-year goals to reduce infant mortality by a percentage to be determined later. Deputy General Counsel Peggy Sidman suggested that the goal in this legislation be stated as "reducing" infant mortality, and then fill in a specific percentage goal via the subsequent legislation that appropriates the funds. Council Member DeFoor felt there should be a detailed plan for how the \$5 million will be spent for accountability purposes. Chairman Bowman said he envisions a 2 step process: 1) file this strategic plan adoption legislation, followed by 2) a separate \$5 million appropriation ordinance with specifics of exactly what will be spent on each item. Council Member Cumber expressed concerned with using the word "eliminate" in several of the goals, since that's going to be very hard to achieve; she suggested instead that "reduce" may be a more attainable goal. Mr. Bowman said wants to see what the Charter Revision Commission has to recommend with regard to citywide strategic planning, which they are discussing. He believes this City Council strategic plan process needs to be more robust.

Motion (Hazouri): approve the strategic plan resolution for filing this week, under the sponsorship of the Finance Committee, with the 2 changes made today – adding a reducing infant mortality issue as a 3-year goal and changing "eliminate" to "reduce" throughout the goals – unanimously approved.

Chairman Bowman said he will be organizing a collection from City Council members to purchase candy to be distributed at the upcoming Martin Luther King Day parade.

Regarding pending ordinance 2019-885 that would amend the contract of City Ethics Officer Carla Miller regarding her weekly working hours, Chairman Bowman said that Ms. Miller had asked if Council would convert the part-time position of an employee in her office into a full-time position. He encouraged the members to talk to Ms. Miller individually about the history of the office and its staffing needs. Council Member Salem recommended inviting her to a future committee meeting to address everyone at once, which Mr. Bowman said he would do.

Public Comment

Stanley Scott recommended that public commenters be introduced as Mr. or Ms., not just their name, as a matter of courtesy. He advocated for increasing equality of outcomes in Jacksonville. He said the city has as leadership problem, particularly in the African American community, and he wants the Chair and Co-Chair of the Crime and Public Safety Task Force to step down. Downtown is trash-strewn. City docks are not handicapped accessible. The Kids Hope Alliance needs African-American management to be representative of the community.
