Chair Salem went through the agenda and noted the actions that would be taken for each bill. He explained that they would take up bill 2020-0486 prior to the JEA presentation to accommodate Council Member Cumber.

Hai Vu, Interim General Manager of the Water & Wastewater System of JEA, provided a presentation on the status of septic tanks and septic tank removal projects across the City. Mr. Vu discussed the various funding methods that residents are using for septic tank removals, including limited grants, sales taxes, and payments directly from the property owners. The City has a active septic tank phaseout program (STOP) to address the 65,000+ remaining septic systems in the City. The expected cost to remove all of the septic systems in Jacksonville is approximately two-billion dollars (\$2B). Mr. Vu explained that the list of prioritized areas for the STOP program to operate in is assessed and reprioritized annually based on environmental issues, health and welfare concerns, and community considerations. The current priority list was presented showing the top ten areas with Biltmore C, Beverly Hills, and Christobel making up the top three priority areas. Updates were provided for multiple areas, including the overall project status, the percentage of project completion, expected completion dates, and other pertinent information related to each area. In 2019 JEA made it a priority to look for alternative procedures and designs for creating and removing septic tanks, including technological updates, potential cost reductions, and creating strategies for septic tank removal for each priority area. JEA has come up with a masterplan for the STOP program. Mr. Vu discussed the potential plan and focused on the search for alternative ways of removing or improving the City's septic tank systems. A timeline was provided for the masterplan with Phase 2 of the program starting in the beginning of 2021. Following the presentation, the Chair opened the floor to guestions.

Council Member Morgan opined on the cost of funding the STOP program and said that the fifteen-million dollars (\$15M) that is currently allocated for the program is a "drop in the bucket" and that the costs are significantly higher. Council Member Morgan asked if the two major projects discussed in the presentation have no cost to the homeowners. Mr. Vu confirmed that the projects mentioned have no cost to the homeowners. Council Member Morgan asked about further funding for the program as it moves forward. Mr. Vu stressed the difficulties in finding funding for the STOP program. He said that currently, it is uncertain as to where the future funding for the STOP will come from. Mr. Vu outlined some possible funding sources.

Council Member Ferraro asked about the costs related to septic tank removal at a single area and about alternative methods of waste management that could potential offset some of the costs involved. Mr. Vu said that JEA is looking at alternative measures and that running the waste through a pumping system to a different facility is possible in some areas of the City. Council Member Ferraro asked about potential short-term and long-term funding sources. Mr. Vu said that the financial funding part of the program is not his expertise.

Council Member Gaffney asked if there is a plan for septic tank removal in other areas of the City that are beyond the five programs that have been discussed. Mr. Vu said that

JEA has created a prioritized list of areas requiring septic tank removal, but the plan and funding is limited to the five discussed projects. Council Member Gaffney encouraged Mr. Vu to come back and present with the full list of areas requiring septic tank removal.

Chair Salem said that he will have Mr. Vu come back and present in the future, possibly in May 2021 when phase 2 of the master plan is underway. Chair Salem asked about the 65,000+ septic tank systems in the City and wanted to know how many of those systems are fully functioning and do not need to be removed. Mr. Vu said that JEA identified roughly 42,000 septic systems that are outside of the high priority areas and that the majority of those systems will not need to be replaced. Chair Salem asked about the hook up fees. Mr. Vu said that the hook up fees are in the area of \$3,000 to \$5,000. Chair Salem asked if it is more expensive to conduct removal projects in smaller areas compared to larger areas. Mr. Vu agreed that it is more expensive to operate in a smaller area because there are less homes to spread the costs across. The costs for septic tank removals are steep regardless of the size of the area so it is more cost effective to do projects over larger areas. Chair Salem noted that there are only roughly 1,000 homes that are being served in the top three areas of the program highlighting the magnitude of the septic tank removal effort.

Council Member Morgan asked if there are any estimates of the savings that could be possible by using alternative technologies or methods. Mr. Vu said that they will have estimates once they complete the report portion of creating the master plan for the STOP program. Council Member Morgan asked if the primary focus of the removal program is to limit the impacts on the City's waterways. Mr. Vu said that environmental concerns are definitely one of the driving forces behind the STOP program. Chair Salem thanked Mr. Vu and invited back when JEA completes their masterplan to provide another presentation.

COMMENTARY: Council Member Morgan asked for clarification about the withdrawal request. Chair Salem provided and explanation of the bill saying that this bill pulls out the worker's compensation benefit out of the consolidated system that it currently is in. Chair Salem said that he shared his concerns about pulling a part out of the collective with the JAA board, ultimately leading to the request to withdrawal this and the previous bill, 2020-0058. Council Member Morgan asked if this is the end for these bills or if more requests are anticipated. Chair Salem said that it is his belief that no more requests will be made. Council Member Becton asked for an explanation from the Administration for the reasoning for withdrawing these bills. Philip Peterson, Council Auditor's Office, said that there was an error in one of the lines from the previous year's JAA budget coupled with the added costs to JAA and the City if the bills went through ultimately led to the decision for withdrawal.

EMERGENCY/AMEND(NCSPHS)/APPROVE

COMMENTARY: Council Member Morgan asked about the amendment to change the bill to be a one-cycle emergency. Council Member Dennis said that the bill was initially mistakenly filed as an emergency upon introduction, but the intent was to have the committees have a chance to vote on the bill as a one cycle emergency. Paige Johnston, Office of General Counsel, explained the introduction process and the need to change the emergency to one-cycle to be able to be heard by the standing committees. Council Member Morgan asked for explanation as to why this bill should be a one-cycle emergency. Council Member Dennis explained that this bill is the resolution companion to the ordinance bill 2020-0529 and is needed to encourage the Administration to conduct an actuary impact study that is required to implement bill 2020-0529. Multiple Council Members still had questions regarding the need for emergency status. Philip Peterson, Council Auditor's Office, provided additional clarification noting that the original cause for emergency status was because an actuary impact study needed to be completed prior to the implementation of bill 2020-0529. Mr. Peterson noting that the Administration at the earlier NCSPHS committee meeting said that the actuary impact study has already been started regardless of this resolution's passage. Chair Salem said that the reasoning for the early retirement benefits stems from the COVID-19 pandemic. Mr. Peterson explained some of the changes to the early retirement policy that will be incorporated in the bill. Ms. Johnston explained the nature of the amendments noting the change in emergency status and addressing scrivener's errors. Council Member Dennis briefly explained the genesis of creating these bills noting a story that a constituent shared with him and his hopes and plans for these bills including the understanding that bill 2020-0529 will most likely be substituted based on the findings of the actuary impact study.
