Deputy General Counsel Peggy Sidman explained the Carlucci amendment, which reduces the CIP percentage from 33% to 17%; provides that the allocation shall be used for installation of water and sewer lines, stormwater drainage, road resurfacing, or street lighting; and adds a 5-year sunset provision. Council Member DeFoor asked about the map to be used; Mr. Carlucci said he chose the pre-consolidation City of Jacksonville city limits after looking at several different possibilities. He said he got the idea for this bill from the recommendation of the Task Force on Consolidated Government several years ago. Council Member Morgan asked if the 33% or 17% represented specific dollar amounts for the proposed spending in the target area. Mr. Carlucci said he looked at past CIP spending per council district and did some averaging and felt that 17% targeted to the former city limits represented a reasonable investment that helps move the needle positively for that area without short-changing other parts of the city. Ms. Morgan asked how he envisioned the projects being proposed and Mr. Carlucci said he anticipated that council members would work with the Mayor's Office to propose projects for the CIP annually. Council Member Cumber asked Jordan Elsbury of the Mayor's Office how this would change the CIP process and whether it would have affected funding levels this year. Mr. Elsbury said Mayor Curry has been concentrating CIP spending in the urban core area since he has been in office. He is confident this year's investment will be close to the 17% the bill requires and they will be cognizant of that in the future if the bill passes.

Council Member Salem asked about any enforcement mechanism. Mr. Carlucci said it's a target and not binding, but the Mayor would have to report the percentage spent in the CIP so the Council would be aware of performance toward the target. Mr. Salem asked how the target percentages apply to the 5-year CIP plan. Mr. Elsbury said understood that 17% of each year's CIP expenditure would be programmed for the type of covered projects in the target area. Mr. Carlucci said the annual report will be via the budget ordinance. The current administration is committed to doing this, but he wants to be sure that it continues beyond Mayor Curry's term. Council Member Priestly Jackson asked Mr. Carlucci if he proposed breaking down expenditures by individual council districts; he said he did not. Council members should talk to the Mayor about what projects they want in the CIP. Ms. Priestly Jackson said the old city limits does not reflect the current predominantly minority districts of 7, 8, 9 and 10 where the need is greatest. Her district will not get anything under the 17% urban core allocation so she can't support the bill. Mr. Carlucci said looked at a variety of maps for potential target areas, and ended up going with what he campaigned on - the pre-consolidation city limits. Council Member Morgan said the underserved areas of the city have a long history of not getting a fair share of City investment, so having access to the remaining 83% of the CIP isn't necessarily comforting. She want to hear from Council Member Pittman before she decides how to vote.

Council Member DeFoor said the biggest part of the proposed map covers council districts 7 and 9 and a bit of 8, so it's hitting the target of old, needy neighborhoods. Council Member Salem suggested to Mr. Elsbury that before next week's council meeting he tally up the CIP spending in districts 7, 8, 9 and 10 showing how much has been spent there in the last 5 years (excluding projects like Shands Hospital, the Jacksonville Zoo, etc. that aren't neighborhood improvement projects). Mr. Elsbury said

the administration is fine with the bill because it's confident it's already doing what would be required and is happy to report on that. They will have those figures for Tuesday. Council Member Wilson said the septic tank remediation process prioritized the neediest areas and some of them are not covered by the proposed map, so he can't support it. Ms. Priestly Jackson said she's looked at CIP for the past 5 years and does not see that districts 7, 8, 9 and 10 have gotten any substantial bump in spending. There is still not equity.

In response to a question from Council Member Salem about how changing the rate in one year would impact the City budget, Ms. Taylor said it doesn't really impact 1 year because the system takes a long-term view. The City would have to have several bad years in a row to consider making a change in the assumed rate.

Council Member Cumber offered a substitute to the bill requested by the Kids Hope Alliance. Kim Taylor described the Auditor's concerns about no cap on transfer authority between categories and how the substitute addresses it by referring transfers over 25% to City Council and by allowing re-purposing of funds from expired contracts. The substitute provides a change for a direct contract for Communities in Schools for the Carter G. Woodson School for 2 additional years and permits existing direct contracts named in the bill to be renewed for 2 years. Ms. Cumber described the purpose of the substitute to deal with transferring available funds for appropriate KHA uses within the fiscal year appropriated. She expressed philosophical opposition to most direct contracting provisions unless the service and the proposed provider are very specialized and unique.

Council Member Salem asked for clarification about the transfer authority and the use of year-end unused funds. KHA Interim CEO Mike Weinstein explained the year-end fund sweep process and the usual process of KHA requesting that the swept funds be reallocated back to its budget for the next year. This new process in the substitute will simplify that process by allowing KHA to keep a minimal amount of fund balance to carry-over to the next year, and the transfer authority will keep that balance minimal because unused funds will be allocated to other similar authorized uses. Mr. Weinstein explained the request to remove the KIPP Schools from the list of direct contracts because he committed to do that earlier in the year. Council Member Morgan felt that City Council should at least be notified of changes in continuing contracts; Mr. Weinstein said he's fine with expanded reporting if that's what Council wants. Council Member Priestly Jackson asked about the difference between the Mayor's transfer authority and KHA's authority. Kim Taylor said KHA can now transfer up to 10% between essential service program categories and the Mayor can transfer up to \$500,000 without Council approval; the substitute allows KHA up to 25% transfer authority and allows reallocation of funds from expired contracts. Budget Officer Angela Moyer said the Finance Department already makes a quarterly report of all transfers that don't come to City Council for approval; Chairman Carlucci said he will put that on the Finance agenda when it's released. Ms. Priestly Jackson asked for monthly reports since the limit is being raised substantially from 10% to 25% and offered an amendment to that effect- approved

Ms. Cumber asked for clarification of the Carter G. Woodson School direct contract terms and the process for doing an RFP. She proposed an amendment strike Sec. (f) of the substitute to remove the direct contract with Communities in Schools for Carter G. Woodson School after this year and have KHA do an RFP for next school year's services. Council Member DeFoor pointed out a duplicate section numbering problem in the substitute. Ms. Cumber said that striking (f) would get rid of direct contracts with both KIPP and Communities in Schools for next school year. Kim Taylor noted that amendment would also require an amendment to Schedule M to move funding from the Communities In Schools contract line to and RFP line. Council Member Priestly Jackson recommended leaving the direct contracting language in for now because the school closing situation is so fluid and will depend in part on what happens with the School Board half cent sales tax referendum in November. Julie Davis of the Office of General Counsel summarized the proposed amendments to the substitute for clarity.

Council Member Cumber explained that this bill codifies what the Finance Committee did in the budget hearing regarding requiring agencies getting City funding to have MOUs with the Sheriff's Office if they provide services to sexual offenders or sexual predators. Council Member DeFoor wanted assurance that the bill is not removing funding for services that help sexual offenders to help them be productive citizens and therefore safer for the community. In response to a question from Ms. DeFoor about what does the MOU covers, Ms. Cumber said that is not prescribed in the bill so the JSO and the funded organization can work that out on a case-by-case basis. Council Member Priestly Jackson asked why sexual offenders are included in this bill when they were contemplated to be excluded in the discussion at the budget hearing. Ms. Cumber said they were never meant to be excluded; the budget ordinance provision on this subject included them last year and this year. Council Member Salem asked to be added as a co-sponsor.

Council Member Morgan said she is supportive of the concept but thinks the ordinance isn't clear about what's being amended until well into the bill and asked if the language could be rearranged. Ms. Cumber explained that it's written the way it is because it has to use the existing ordinance language and get to the amendment where it falls in the current language. Peggy Sidman suggested adding language in the bill title to make it clearer what the bill is doing. Ms. Morgan proposed an amendment to add language to the bill title to reference the requirement for an MOU with the JSO, which was approved. Council Member Priestly Jackson asked about whether this bill imposes any obligations on the Sheriff's Office outside of the MOU. Ms. Cumber said no other obligations are entailed, and she worked with both JSO and Prisoners of Christ and both agreed to this language so she doesn't want to change what they have agreed to. Ms. Priestly Jackson felt the reference to "requirements of Florida law" seems to go beyond what the MOU covers. Lt. Derek Porter with the JSO offender tracking unit said he agrees with the language as proposed. He does not see that the MOU would add any additional requirements to what JSO already has to do under state law. It would only require sharing of information to allow better tracking of sexual offenders or predators. He agreed to come back to Council if any additional requirement is identified.

Council Member Dennis explained the reason for the proposal because so many parties involved in the JEA privatization investigation are hiring private legal counsel. The OGC has surveyed reasonable legal fees in the Jacksonville market. The bill caps hourly fees and requires the OGC to be notified that a City employee or official plans to utilize private counsel and bill the City; if they don't then the request for reimbursement needs to go to City Council for approval. Council Member Cumber asked if the person being investigated can hire any attorney they want and pay the difference above the cap. Jon Phillips of the OGC said yes. Ms. Cumber liked the idea of doing an annual legal fee review but thinks the cap might be constricting. Mr. Dennis said the OGC can recommend a change in the cap based on the results of the annual review. Council Member Salem said the rates he's been seeing in the JEA investigation documents are considerably higher than \$350 an hour. He prefers that the OGC recommend cap changes whenever it's needed rather than annually. In response to a question from Mr. Salem about whether the City pays travel expenses for out-of-town attorneys. Mr. Phillips said he personally (not speaking on behalf of the OGC) does not think the city would be liable for travel expenses as "reasonable" attorney fees, but it may take litigation to completely settle the question about travel expenses and reasonable hourly fees. Council Member Salem asked about the privacy implications of the advance notice requirement.

Council Member DeFoor said standardized rates are very common in the private sector. She asked if the notice to the OGC is covered by attorney-client privilege; Mr. Phillips agreed that in most circumstances it would be covered, subject to applicable public records law provisions. Chairman Carlucci felt that a cap will need to be regularly reevaluated and occasionally amended as necessary, which will require someone to be responsible for it. He is uncomfortable with the prospect that the notification requirement might become public and lead to unwarranted speculation about why a public official would be retaining an attorney. Paige Johnston said she has researched other Florida jurisdictions and some are more specific in their requirements for what must be submitted in the initial notice. For privacy purposes the bill offers an option to file the reimbursement notification at the end of the process when the issue is resolved, which would require City Council approval before the reimbursement could be approved. Council Member Priestly Jackson recommended that the bill be deferred in Finance and workshopped in the Rules Committee to iron out all the issues. Mr. Dennis said he'll agree to defer it today if the Finance Committee will agree to a full debate and decision at the next meeting, to which Mr. Carlucci agreed.

Council Member Salem reported that the JEA has long had a short-term performance incentive plan, which does not cover the senior management. It was recently discovered that state law says that if you have a bonus plan, all employees of the agency must be eligible. He has recommended to the JEA board that they approve such a plan for senior management, which they are willing to do and they have sufficient funds in their budget to cover the cost.

## **Public Comment**

Carnell Oliver said he questions the need for the Sheriff's Office to be purchasing SUVs instead of sedans, which seems a frivolous expense. He understands from the Auditor's Office that there are a number of vacant positions in the JSO budget that he believes need to be redlined and eliminated. JSO could be run more efficiently.

Stanley Scott said 2020-418 is a quota bill. He agrees with Council Member Priestly Jackson that the Northside has never gotten justice from the City. After 50 years the problems are still the same. On bill 2020-510 he disagrees with giving the Chamber of Commerce \$400,000 a year. Regarding 2020-511 he believes the KHA needs more accountability. When is the City ever going to step up and do the right thing for the African-American community?

- Creates a new Part 3 within Ord. Code Ch. 55 to establish a Downtown Preservation and Revitalization Program ("DPRP") and adopts guidelines for the program
- Revises the City's Public Investment Policy to incorporate the guidelines
- Provides for a 90 day phase-in period for new guidelines

# **HPRTF Summary**

- Maximum grant amount of \$100,000 per project (formerly \$1,000,000)
- Grants will have a five year term, forgiven 20% per year, with a clawback in the event of sale, transfer, or default
- Approved by DIA without further Council action, subject to availability of unencumbered funds
- Project must be located within DIA boundary
- Structures must either be designated a local historic landmark or have submitted an application for designation at time of application for HPRTF funding and must be designated prior to disbursement of funding
- All work must be reviewed and approved by the Planning and Development Department
- Revises funding limits to 20% 75% of eligible costs based on the type of rehabilitation
- Establishes a maximum funding level of 40% of total development costs ("TDC")
- Requires minimum developer equity of 10% of TDC
- Establishes a minimum ROI of 0.50x

# **DPRP Summary**

- Project must be located within DIA boundary
- Designed to support projects in excess of \$100,000
- Each project requires City Council approval
- Three general funding components Historic Preservation Restoration and Rehabilitation Forgivable Loan, Code Compliance Renovations Forgivable Loan, and Downtown Preservation and Revitalization Program Gap Loan
- Requires minimum developer equity of 10% of TDC
- Establishes a minimum ROI of 0.50x
- All agreements include clawback language
- Establishes total City funding limits of 25% 50% depending on developer equity and local landmark status

# Historic Preservation Restoration and Rehabilitation Forgivable Loan ("HPRR Forgivable Loan")

- Building must be designated as a local historic landmark in order to receive funding
- Funding not to exceed 30% of TDC and limited to 20% 70% of eligible costs based on

# the type of rehabilitation

• Structured as a 5-year, interest-free forgivable loan

**Code Compliance Renovations Forgivable Loan ("CCR Forgivable Loan")** 

- Building not required to be a local historic landmark but must be a contributing structure in the Downtown National Historic District or be at least 50 years old
- May include up to 75% of eligible costs for bringing the property up to Code, including costs of environmental remediation or abatement and costs related to fire and safety requirements
- Funding not to exceed 30% of TDC when the building is a locally designated landmark or 25% of TDC when the building is not designated a local landmark
- Structured as a 10-year, interest-free forgivable loan

**Downtown Preservation and Revitalization Program Gap Loan ("DPRP Gap Loan")** 

- Loan will be not less than 20% of gap funding where developer equity (net of developer fee) is less than 25% of TDC
- Gap loan may not exceed 20% of TDC and may not be used on a stand alone basis
- Structured as non-amortizing 10-year loan, with interest payable annually equal to the
  10 year Treasury note rate at the time of closing
- Partial principal reductions may be made after the 5th anniversary with no prepayment penalty, however, 50% of the loan balance must remain outstanding through the loan maturity date unless the property is sold or refinanced
