Bill Clement of the Sheriff's Office said KHA will administer the grants. Phillip Peterson explained the amendment. Council Member Morgan asked how much is left in the Law Enforcement Trust Fund after this appropriation; Mr. Clement will let her know. In response to a question about how community organizations know these funds are available and how to apply, Mr. Clement said the KHA put out an RFP for use of these funds instead of the JSO making the appropriations directly as they used to do. Mr. Peterson said there's about \$300,000 in the fund now and this will use \$40,000. Council Member DeFoor asked what specifically the RFP asked for. KHA Interim Executive Director Mike Weinstein said they advertised for a variety of crime prevention activities; the respondents are providing sports, financial literacy, drug counseling, and character building programming, all via summer programs. Each has deliverables and will be tracked. KHA is finally getting a formalized Memorandum of Understanding with the Duval County Schools to be able to track how well the participants in KHA programs do in school after these programs (attendance, grades). In response to a guestion from Ms. Morgan, Mr. Weinstein said this RFP was just for summer programming; using the rest of the Law Enforcement Trust Fund is at the discretion of the JSO and what they want it to go for.

Council Member Salem said he is very interested in the follow-up process - how it will be done and for how long. Ms. Weinstein said a true longitudinal study would be best, but these are very small grants for short-term programs this time. They do the best they can to track outcomes but this will be the first time they've had an MOU with the school system, which will be much improved over the old method. Mr. Salem said tracking outcomes is very important as the City needs to determine what works, not just who got funded last year, despite the difficulty of doing it. Mr. Weinstein said ideally the KHA would have goals in mind and recruit entities that do what is wanted rather than just fund anybody who applies with an idea and a program.

Public Hearing Pursuant to Chapt 166, F.S. & CR 3.601 –10/27/20

Deputy General Counsel Peggy Sidman explained the use of the funding for legal counsel fees for elected and appointed officials and City employees who are interviewed as part of a legal matter or an investigation, assuming no wrongdoing is found. In response to a question from Council Member Cumber about whether the \$250,000 is all for legal expenses relating to the Special Investigatory Committee on JEA's ongoing investigations, Ms. Sidman stated that the appropriation is not specific to the JEA SIC and could be used for any approved outside counsel billings. At this time pending outside counsel invoices totaling \$60,000 have been remitted to OGC. Ms. Cumber received confirmation that the \$250,000 is not specific to JEA-related claims. Council Member Salem asked how outside counsel expenses can be reimbursed since it is not yet known if the employees/officials hiring outside counsel are eligible for reimbursement since that will depend on whether or not they are exonerated of wrongdoing. Deputy General Counsel Jon Phillips said if there are indictments then reimbursements will not be authorized for their legal expenses until resolution of the matter. No determination to pay any SIC-related bills has been made yet. Mr. Salem asked why \$250,000 is being appropriated rather than the \$60,000 for bills currently pending. He was told that is an estimate of what will be needed by the end of the fiscal year for expenses related to the JEA SIC and another ongoing investigation. Regarding who makes the determination that outside counsel bills are appropriate to be paid, Mr. Phillips said that it is ultimately General Counsel Jason Gabriel's call to make, with advice from his staff. Chairman Carlucci said the Finance Committee Chair signs off on some kinds of legal settlements, but he doesn't know if that includes attorney fee decisions.

Council Member Priestly Jackson said her understanding is that this appropriation will be in an OGC professional services account for whatever bills may be submitted for later approval and payment. Jon Phillips said that one case has been resolved and the employee exonerated so that bill will be paid. Ms. Priestly Jackson said the OGC is involved on the front end of the hiring process for outside attorneys so knows generally what is coming. Mr. Phillips said that is the case for the \$60,000 of invoices already submitted, but the OGC doesn't know about hirings 100% of the time; sometimes someone will hire an attorney without telling OGC and then submit a bill later. Ms. Priestly Jackson said the \$190,000 allocation (the portion of the requested \$250,000 appropriation not needed for the \$60,000 of pending invoices) is not solely due to the activities of the SIC; a number of people got subpoenas from JEA and got attorneys for inquiries unrelated to what the SIC was doing. In response to a question from Council Member Morgan about whether there is a possibility that the OGC might need more than \$250,000, Mr. Phillips said his best assessment is that this will be sufficient, but that can't be known for sure.

Council Member DeFoor asked the amount of the non-JEA-related pending invoice - it is \$14,296. Ms. DeFoor asked if any of the bills are for legal services for Aaron Zahn related to his case against JEA. Mr. Phillips said they are not. Mr. Zahn's claim for reimbursement would be to the JEA, not the City, if he prevails. Ms. DeFoor asked if this type of outside counsel reimbursement applies to both criminal and civil case costs; it does. In response to another question from Ms. DeFoor, Mr. Phillips said that hiring of 4 attorneys with regard to JEA-related issues has approved so far. Ms. Cumber again asked for clarity on whether any of the pending bills are SIC related. Mr. Phillips said 4 of the invoices making up the \$60,000 in pending bills are SCI-related, 1 is not. Ms. Cumber asked what balance will be left in the OGC pension contingency fund if this \$250,000 is approved. Phillip Peterson said it will be \$439,000 after this appropriation is approved. Ms. Priestly Jackson said whe will follow up with Mr. Phillips about the 4 JEA-related outside counsels – she wants to know which were due to SIC interviews and which were due to JEA/Aaron Zahn subpoenas, the cost of which should be borne by JEA, not the City.

Phillip Peterson explained the amendment. Council Member Priestly Jackson asked if this bill affects the City's debt capacity. Mr. Peterson said it does not; the City is strictly a conduit for lending but has no liability for the bonds. Council Member Salem said he has been hearing from constituents about why the City is helping charter schools. Economic Development Officer Kirk Wendland said the City has no liability for the bonds and is just a conduit for non-taxable borrowing. It is a mechanism available to whatever qualifying entity wants to use it. These bonds have been used for health care facilities and are also available for industrial uses, but rarely used for that due to restrictions on what size of project can be assisted. Council Member Morgan asked how entities know to ask the City for issuance of these bonds and whether their availability is advertised. Mr. Wendland said this is a federal, not a City, program. There is an application that requires an opinion from bond counsel on the legality of the use under the federal tax code.

In response to a question from Ms. Morgan about whether the City has any say over where these projects go, Mr. Wendland said it does not; the applicant brings a project to the City. Ms. Morgan asked if there is any coordination with the Duval Schools or any way to condition the use of the bonds. Mr. Wendland said the user would have to go through all the usual charter school steps and requirements, regardless of how they borrowed the funds for the project. Mr. Carlucci said he had spoken to a School Board member and told them that the City is just a conduit borrower and doesn't have any regulatory authority over the project. There is a City/School District Coordinating Committee and that's probably where questions or concerns should go about the project itself and its potential effect on public schools.

Public Works Director John Pappas explained the concept of selling water quality compensatory credits that are a by-product of building stormwater ponds that have a water quality benefit in addition to the primary water quantity purpose. He clarified his response to a question from Council Member Salem at a meeting yesterday that credits sold to private developers must be used within the drainage basin where the credits were created. Council Member DeFoor asked if there is any reason for the City to keep the credits for itself. Mr. Pappas said they could be useful in some circumstances but there are other ways to reach the City's water quality goals and monetizing these credits to do more drainage work is very valuable. Ms. DeFoor asked about the plan for using the \$23 million in revenue it looks like these credits could produce if sold. Mr. Pappas said the use of the credits is restrictive so the City might not sell them all and generate the full \$23M. The funds generated from the sales can be used anywhere in the city. Chairman Carlucci expressed concerned that credits generated from a project in one place can be used on projects elsewhere, which doesn't seem quite fair to the area where the credits were generated. Mr. Pappas said new developments using the credits do need to provide at least minimal treatment (i.e. baffle boxes), but not the full-blown pond development usually required.

Rita Mairs of the Office of General Counsel explained the amendment, which was not marked on the agenda. It substitutes a signed release in place of an unsigned release, adds a payment date, and takes care of several cleanup issues. Council Member DeFoor asked if the payment date for the true-up to a widow beneficiary of the plan could be moved up a few days to precede the holiday season. CFO Joey Greive said the modification of the payment amounts has already been done; this bill only addresses John Keane's legal settlement. Terry Wood representing the City Board of Pension Trustees said as soon as the City gave payment control over the pension fund back to the PFPF, they made the adjustments to the participants immediately.

Council Member Cumber said she opposes the settlement and will be voting "no" on the bill. She asked on what issues the City compromised (as referenced in the settlement agreement). Ms. Mairs said Mr. Keane made several demands that were more than what is covered by this settlement, so the compromise settlement was a benefit to the City. Ms. Cumber said it seems to her like Mr. Keane got almost everything he wanted and it's a terrible deal for the City. The court's ruling points out the need to deal with the concept of what it means for an authority board to "fix compensation" and how smart people will figure out ways to take advantage of that language. The Council needs to find a way, while it is amending the JEA charter, to rein in potential loopholes and wrongdoing in the future for JEA and all the other authorities. She is considering introducing legislation to that effect. Ms. Mairs said that Ordinance 2015-304-E enshrined an agreement with PFPF to put future employees into existing City pension plans and to clarify that the OGC is the counsel for the fund on all routine matters (excluding specialized pension issues). Ordinance 2017-257-E closed out new membership in all defined benefit pension plans as of 2017 and required that PFPF employees be members of the General Employees Retirement Plan. Ms. Cumber said that the fear of having to pay an opponent's attorney fees should not be a reason to not pursue litigation when we think the City is in the right.

Phillip Peterson posed a question from the Auditor's Office about the settlement's impact on Mr. Keane's cost-of-living adjustment. If it is discovered that the COLA has been miscalculated, would this settlement prevent rectifying that? Ms. Mairs said it was not intended to prevent that and a calculation error could be corrected. She said the agreed-upon wording was intended to prevent a future mayor or council from deciding to change the calculation methodology.

Council Member Salem said he requested legislation saying that only CEOs of authorities should have employment contracts, but had to do it as a resolution rather than an ordinance because of the way the other authorities are structured. He asked what happens if another authority tries to create a separate pension plan tomorrow – how could the Council stop that? Ms. Mairs said the authorities are all created differently so no blanket solution will work. It would be necessary to craft individual restrictions for each authority based on what authority the City has with regard to that authority. Ms. Salem asked the OGC to determine for each authority what would need to be done to prevent side-compensation and pension deals. Ms. Mairs said she is ready and willing to help in that effort because it's important to prevent this situation from happening again.

Council Member Priestly Jackson said she is troubled by Judge Roberson's ruling in this case and is glad that the City achieved this settlement despite what that could have allowed by that ruling. She thinks the Council needs an advisory opinion from OGC on what the City Council can and cannot due with regard to controlling each of the authorities with regard to management compensation. Council Member DeFoor said she was not happy with the outcome but is glad the settlement is as favorable to the City as it is. She will convey this committee's message to JEA so they can include it in their current board policy rewrite process. She agrees with getting legal opinions on what can be done with the other authorities.

If the Company fails to invest at least \$7,000,000 by December 31, 2022, the REV grant will be terminated and the Company will repay the City the entire amount of the REV grant that has been previously paid to the Company, if any.
- Section 9.2(c) In the event the Company fails to create and maintain a minimum of 50 new jobs at an average wage of no less than \$30,000 by December 31, 2023, and to maintain the 50 permanent jobs at an average annual salary of \$30,000 and the 90 retained jobs for the length of the REV grant, the annual payment of the REV grant will be reduced pro-rata for each year the Company is under the 140 job retention requirement.
