Council Auditor Kim Taylor to discuss: Report #793A: Follow-up on Nonresidential Solid Waste Franchise Fees Audit

Council Auditor Kim Taylor reviewed recently released Audit #793A: Follow-up on Nonresidential Solid Waste Franchise Fees Audit. The original audit identified 14 issues/opportunities for improvement; 10 have been cleared and the Solid Waste Division is still working on 4 issues:

- 1) Fees not being calculated correctly leading to several under-payments;
- 2) Lack of consistency in how franchise fees are shown on customer bills;
- 3) Insurance certificates, payment bonds and annual reports not all as required by Code;
- 4) Renewal applications filed incomplete and not filed timely.
- The Auditor's Office will follow up again in 12-18 months to ensure compliance.

Council Member DeFoor asked if the underpayments across the board or occurred with just one or two particular companies? Ms. Taylor said she will inquire and report back on that issue.

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Council Member Salem asked about the organizational location of the position; Chief Operating Officer Stephanie Burch said the bill as written will create a new division in the Planning Department, starting as a 1-person division. Chairman Carlucci said the resiliency function will become increasingly important and he anticipates that it will grow to multiple employees and functions over the years. Ms. Burch said the administration disagrees with creating a division at this point; they would prefer to hire a Chief Resilience Officer and let them determine what structure would make sense. Council Member DeFoor said division status is important to handle all the functions that will need to be handled. Chairman Carlucci expressed surprise at the administration's objection to the creation of a division; he had not heard any objection to that in previous discussions with the administration. Ms. Burch disagreed and said she had made the administration's objection to creating a division known previously.

Council Member Cumber inquired about the cost of creating a division instead of just hiring an employee. Phillip Peterson said that would be difficult to determine until a definitive proposal is made about a division's size and functions so that associated costs could be estimated. Ms. Cumber asked how the \$300,000 appropriation for the CRO function was arrived at. Council Auditor Kim Taylor said it came from the City Council's strategic priority setting process last year and from research on what other cities paid CROs. \$75,000 was put in the budget as a placeholder salary for the CRO with the expectation that it could be more. In response to a question from Ms. Cumber about the Planning Department's current divisions, Planning and Development Director Bill Killingsworth said there are currently 5 divisions. The impact of a new division would depend on what the new CRO recommends. Council Member Morgan asked for confirmation that the CRO would report directly to Mr. Killingsworth; he confirmed they would. Ms. Morgan endorsed the creation of a division so that CRO candidates and the general public know that the City is serious about resilience and doing substantive work in that area. Mr. Salem said that division status is important to attracting top CRO candidates.

Council Member Priestly Jackson felt that creating a new division seems like an infringement on the prerogative of the executive branch, given advice the OGC has given the Council in the past about its control over entities in other circumstances. Deputy General Counsel Peggy Sidman said that the Code provides that the executive branch can propose reorganizations of that branch. The Council budgeted for the creation of this position and now it's just a question of where it will be located. The Chair said that hiring the position is not the issue, creating a division over the administration's objection is the issue. Ms. DeFoor said the fact that a budget line item can go away at any time says that the City is not serious about resilience; creation of a division shows serious intent. The CRO needs to be a facilitator for cross-pollination and breaking out of silos to address issues across the government. Council Member Cumber expressed concerned about creating a division for the purpose of sending a message about looking serious; that sets a bad precedent. She sees no practical difference since the CRO will report to the Planning Director either way and is concerned about overreach into the executive branch's prerogatives. Ms. Priestly Jackson agreed with Ms. Cumber that the Council is sending mixed signals with how it interacts with the administration from issue to issue.

Chairman Carlucci felt a division is needed to marshal the resources needed to deal with all of the resilience issues facing the City. He asked about a cap of \$75,000 on the CRO position mentioned earlier. Mr. Peterson said \$75,000 is a placeholder figure and can be changed by the administration through the Mayor's Budget Review Committee process. Ms. Burch said the intention is to hire at \$125,000. Mr. Salem said it needs to be clear that the salary is advertised at \$125,000 because that affects the caliber of the candidates you will get. Ms. Burch confirmed that it will be advertised at \$125,000. The administration is fine with codifying the position, it's the creation of a division in this bill that was a surprise and not what they were expecting. When it's time to hire a CRO, MBRC will move the funds to the salary line. In response to a question from Ms. DeFoor about the nature of the administration's objection to creating a division Ms. Burch said they prefer to hire a CRO and let that person learn how Jacksonville city government works, what the local issues are, what the Special Committee on Resiliency has been doing, etc. and then make recommendations for how to proceed. Maybe it doesn't belong in the Planning Department and somewhere else would be better; we don't know that until they get here and start to work. Mr. Carlucci expressed surprise at the opposition to creating a division, saying he's never heard that from the administration. He's willing to amend that out as long as the position is created and the full \$300,000 is put to work on resilience.

Motion (DeFoor): substitute the bill to codify a CRO position in the office of the Director of Planning and Development

Chief Administrative Officer Brian Hughes said the administration agrees with hiring a CRO and may eventually agree to creation of a division depending on what the new CRO has to say when they arrive. Phillip Peterson explained the amendment to add the emergency approval language. Assistant General Counsel Shannon Eller gave an overview of the bill, which is the necessary first step in a multi-step process to consider a potential increase in the solid waste user fee in next year's budget.

Council Member Cumber opposed the bill because it could lead to a fee increase. She believes solid waste collection is a fundamental government service and perhaps should go back to being funded by the General Fund rather than via a user fee. This proposal is especially troublesome to her given the number of solid waste service complaints the City is currently receiving. Council Member Salem said the General Fund has been subsidizing between \$10 million and \$20 million to the Solid Waste Fund each year as a loan and that amount is growing. He believes in fees for services where they are appropriate, such as solid waste. He recommended a joint Finance/PHS committee meeting to delve into numerous solid waste and recycling issues. If this resolution doesn't pass then the Council couldn't raise the fee even if that is determined to be the right thing to do. Council Member DeFoor asked for clarification about the removal of the fee waiver provision from the budget ordinance this year. Kim Taylor said the Council waived the automatic fee increase provision but removed the waiver of doing the fee study so that study could take place.

The Chair asked Shannon Eller to review the 3-step process for changing the non-ad valorem special assessment under the Florida Statutes and Ordinance Code. Ms. Cumber said that the solid waste service level is completely separate from the funding level. She's not convinced that the proposed transfer station will solve the current collection service level problems. Rates should not be increased until the service issues are addressed. Chairman Carlucci said a decision was made to impose fees many years ago to raise the revenues needed to provide services. He believes Council shouldn't keep waiving the fee coverage policy year after year; if we're not going to abide by it then we should rescind it. He wants to know what the administration thinks is the right way to fund solid waste. Chief Financial Officer Joey Greive said the fee reviews of the 4 enterprise funds promised during the budget hearing process have been completed and the review of the rest of the City's fees is underway and will be completed by the end of December.

Council Member Salem explained the need for the emergency to get the program started as guickly as possible in order to get the maximum data collection on the pilot project before next year's budget process. Chief Judge Mark Mahon and Cindy Funkhouser, CEO of the Sulzbacher Center for the Homeless, spoke in favor of ordinance 2020 -733, saying it will save the City money by getting mental health treatment out of the jail and into a much less expensive venue. This will be a pilot program modeled after a very successful program operating in Miami. Ms. Funkhouser said that jails and prisons are the de facto primary mental health service providers in America. 925 individuals arrested last year in Jacksonville had mental health issues and some were arrested numerous times. Lutheran Social Services, Gateway Community Services, the Sulzbacher Center, Public Defender, State Attorney, and judges all partnering on this initiative. This will be a pre-trial diversion program to develop a customized care plan that will have to be approved by the judge, the participant, the State Attorney and the Public Defender. A full spectrum of care and services will be provided - mental health, job training, housing, substance abuse treatment, medication, etc. The have had tremendous success with a similar program in Miami, which hopefully can be replicated here. The program operators will report monthly to the Special Committee on Opioids and Mental Health.

Council Member DeFoor thanked Judge Mahon for championing this initiative. She asked Ms. Funkhouser if the project will be tapping SSI and SSDI funding for housing; it will. Council Member Priestly Jackson oppose moving this bill as an emergency so that all proposals for funding from the Social Justice and Community Investment Special Committee, some submitted several months ago, can be evaluated and compared together. Ms. Cumber supported the emergency, noting that the Council President said when the Special Committee on Social Justice and Community Investment up by SJCI consideration. Ms. Priestly Jackson said the special committee adopted a process to evaluate and rank all proposals and then make legislative proposals; this bill jumps ahead of that process by filing the legislation before SJCI's consideration.

Ms. DeFoor asked what happens if the standing committees approve the bill and SJIC doesn't. Ms. Sidman said the Rules Chair has said this bill won't come out of Rules before SJCI acts; if Council wanted to act before SJCI reported, the bill would have to be discharged from the Rules Committee in order to take action. It's not legally required that SJCI approve the use of the funds before Council can act, but there was an informal agreement among the committee chairs for how the process would work. Mr. Carlucci said he's just trying to get the bill in a posture to move on before the end of the year if SJCI agrees to fund the proposal at its meeting next Monday. Mr. Salem said mental health care is a tremendous need in our community and he's sure that SJCI will approve it next week and the Council President will put it on the agenda for action next Tuesday. Ms. Priestly Jackson said SJCI has been studying and ranking priority issues and determining what needs to be funded. She told all council members who wanted to propose uses of the available funding to wait until a unified evaluation process could take place, so that's what she's going to do.

Public Comment

Carnell Oliver suggested adding an amendment to the pending Lot J development agreement bill to require the administration to study the cost of stadium improvements. He recommended use \$1M of the funding allocated to the Special Committee on Social Justice and Community Investment for job training for people to work on the Lot J project. Non-profits that are primarily social service agencies shouldn't be getting funds that ought to be devoted to economic incentives. The festival held on A. Phillip Randolph Boulevard last week needs more support.

Stanley Scott said council members use the Ordinance Code to their own advantage when it suits them. He advocates for workshops for the community to be engaged in the work of the Special Committee on Social Justice and Community Investment and expressing their own priorities. Jacksonville's community is not civically engaged with city government; only 4 or 5 people care enough to come to City Hill to see what's happening and express their thoughts. Jacksonville hasn't changed in 50 years in part because it doesn't seek out citizen opinions. 30% of Lot J contracts, if that project is approved, should go to local minority companies.

Council Member Priestly Jackson announced that there is a meeting tomorrow evening at 5 p.m. to discuss job programs as a direct result of the feedback from local non-profits that have highlighted the importance of employment opportunity.

Chairman Carlucci thanked the members of the Finance Committee for being fair and respectful in their debate despite occasional differences of opinion. Important work is being done by the committee and all points of view are being expressed and fairly debated.
