Council Auditor Presentations

- * Report #869, Public Works Construction-Related Vendors Audit: Council Auditor Kim Taylor reported that the audit reviewed how contracts for the three construction-related vendors paid the most from 10/1/16 through 9/30/20 were procured and whether payments were accurate, properly supported, authorized and timely. Findings included: the Public Works Department lacked standard operating procedures in this area, such as for monitoring and inspection of big projects; some change orders were approved after contract expiration or paid prior to the change order being finalized; issues with calculating bid amounts due to a manual process – the 1Cloud financial management system has automated small (informal) purchases but not large purchases yet; retainage is not being tracked in 1Cloud as it was previously under the old system. As a point of information outside of the audit objectives, Ms. Taylor reported that the City contracts for an average of 45 miles of resurfacing per year, at which rate it would take 80 years to resurface the more than 3,700 miles of roads in the city. The budget has been allocating \$12M per year previously and upwards of \$28 million for resurfacing in recent years (higher in the last couple of years with the infusion of federal ARP funds) but needs are \$42-56M per year to resurface roads in a reasonable time period matching their expected lifespan. CM Salem asked if all audits are reported to the Finance Committee; Ms. Taylor said they, are regardless of type or findings, as the Finance Committee acts as the Council's Audit Committee.
- * Report #763C: Follow-up on JTA Payroll Audit: This third follow-up clears all remaining items and the audit is closed.
- * Report #870: Public Works Department Public Buildings Division Security Guard Contract Audit: the audit found that payments were made properly except for some timeliness issues. Findings included: Public Works lacked some SOPs and record retention policies for documenting changes in pay rates from the contract rate; there were some issues with guards exceeding their maximum allowable hours worked; Public Buildings Division was not notified when guards were terminated by the contractor. In response to a question from CM Morgan about whether there will be a follow-up. Ms. Taylor said there will be. The Public Works Department agreed with the audit findings and has begun taking action to remedy the issues identified.
- * City Annual Audit update: Ms. Taylor said the outside audit will not be done by June 30 as required by state law because the City is still doing some adjusting entries such as with capital items. She hopes it will be completed by mid- to late July. CFO Joey Greive said the auditing firm called last Friday to request some extra time to do some last-minute reconciliations. He will inform the state and knows that they value accuracy more than speed so a couple of more weeks will be needed to produce the best product.

CM Becton briefly described the history of the tree protection litigation and the rationale for his proposed amendment to the settlement agreement in order to provide some penalty flexibility in situations where it is warranted. He has worked with the Planning Department, the Office of General Counsel and the parties to the settlement agreement on this solution. 2023-323 and -324 are companion bills to this one. CM Salem asked for further information on how fines are levied now and how the proposed Ordinance Code amendments would change the process. CM Becton said that the Planning Department will evaluate 5 criteria and use a point system to determine if a reduction in the fine is warranted by special circumstances. There will be an appeal process to the Tree Commission to make a final determination if needed.

CM Pittman said she would be abstaining from the vote because a building owned by the Clara White Mission might be an applicant for these funds if the program is created. CM Carlucci said the creation of the fund would open up opportunities for saving historic buildings.

CM DeFoor discussed the need for completing this study to remedy a serious drainage problem so that City resources aren't unduly burdened in responses to emergency flooding. CM Carlucci spoke in favor of moving the study up and getting work underway to solve the problem. CM Pittman pointed out that areas in her district have the same flooding problems, noted that the Chief Resiliency Office is doing a countywide resiliency study, and asked for an update on its progress. Deputy CAO Charles Moreland said that the countywide study is underway and will determine priorities and what funding is needed. He said that the results of that study will inform the incoming administration about what needs to be done and where and how much.

CM Pittman asked if this proposed study is duplicating what the countywide resiliency study is doing and said that every district's needs have to be addressed equally because there are needs everywhere. Phillip Peterson said there is a Ribault Scenic Drive project in this year's CIP programmed in year one; CM Pittman said that does not address the needs in the Ken Knight Drive area. CM Morgan questioned how deeply the countywide resiliency study will delve into the persistent, known problems in various areas of the city and when it will be completed. CM Carrico said he has a number of questions that only the Chief Resiliency Officer can answer about the scope and depth of her study but understands CM DeFoor's desire to get this bill passed in her last weeks on the Council. CM Salem said there is a tremendous need to solve the flooding problem in front of St. Vincent's Medical Center on Riverside Avenue because of its public health impact. CM Carlucci offered to meet with any council members interested in talking about drainage problems in their area to seek potential solutions.

Council President Freeman said he has had numerous meetings with the administration and the DIA about parking issues and he believes this bill represents a step toward trying to get the best value for the taxpayers by competitively bidding the garage management contract. In response to a question from CM Salem, DIA CEO Lori Boyer said the current management contract has been reviewed by the City's parking consultant and the decision has been made to keep that operator in place until the contract expires in 2025. The DIA will be crafting an RFP to be issued at that time, so she does not object to this resolution. That RFP will be done in coordination with numerous parties such as ASM Global which operates the Sports Complex and the developers of The Doro apartments who would like to utilize some spaces in one of the Sports Complex garages. President Freeman said the JTA is the City's transportation provider and he would like to see them involved in the process, potentially taking over parking garage management from the DIA.

- For the 12-months ended April 2023 of operating the MPS Garages, DIA has experienced an annual surplus of \$1,140,948 prior to debt payments
- The DIA was assigned the contract with the current parking management services company, which began in November 2020, as a result of the mediated settlement agreement approved by City Council in Ordinance 2022-138-E
- The current parking management services agreement for the MPS Garages expires December 31, 2025, contains a termination for convenience clause exercisable by either party with ninety days written notice, and has no extensions available
- JTA currently contracts out operations of its Kings Avenue Parking Garage
