Daryl Joseph, Parks Director, explained the terms of the lease agreement for an office, storage area, gym and a portion of the property at the Mary Lena Gibbs Community Center Complex. This bill extends the lease term for an additional 30 years, until the last day of the school year in 2052. Mr. Joseph said that the extended term is related to financing for facility improvement investments on the part of the school. The lease terms also specify that the S.O.C.K. Outstanding Students (S.O.S.) Academy, Inc. remain a DCPS certified charter school.

CM Boylan asked about rent increases, but the rent will not be changed. The monthly rent is \$2008.38, to be deposited into the SOS Academy Special Revenue Fund and expended for the purpose of maintenance, capital improvements, equipment and renovations for Parks located in Council District 10.

CM DeFoor asked if the lease serves as security on financing arrangements, and what the funds will be used to improve.

Mr. Ansley, S.O.C.K. Outstanding Students (S.O.S.) Academy, Inc Board Member, explained that the funds will go towards new portable classroom units and grounds improvements.

CM Ferraro asked about school performance and if that is connected to the lease. Mr. Ansley said that there are 143 students, with a capacity for 300, and that their school rating is a "C". Mr. Joseph said that performance is not connected to the lease in any way. CM Cumber asked about methods to increase enrollment, and Mr. Ansley said that COVID impacted their numbers but the hope is that the enrollment will increase in the next few years.

Phillip Peterson, Auditor's Office, explained the amendment.

Daryl Joseph, Parks Director, explained the project and how it will increase the number of children served in the Head Start program at that location.

Maria McNair, Head Start Program Director - Lutheran Services, spoke about the Head Start program. Head Start is a federally funded birth-to-5 comprehensive early childhood development program for low income and/or children with special needs, in foster care or experiencing homelessness, and their families. This renovation project will outfit the Moncrief Senior Center facility with 3 classrooms, a therapy room, a kitchen for meals, office space for staff and educators and a new playground to serve a total of 54-60 children (currently 37 students served out of an apartment unit in the nearby Fairway Oaks Apartments). The Moncrief Senior Center is no longer being used for senior activities, as it was relocated to a new location. Ms. McNair noted that the children in the program will live proximal to the facility, most from the public housing that is adjacent.

Bill Clement, JSO, explained this appropriation and how it will be used. The funds will go toward the Impaired Driving Enforcement Project, in an effort to decrease the percentage of impaired-driving fatalities and crashes throughout the city.

CM Cumber asked how many checkpoints this funding will provide for, and for more specifics on the enforcement project. Lt. Kenneth Lamb, JSO's specialized traffic enforcement unit, spoke about the funding and how it will cover staffing overtime for impaired-driving checkpoints and necessary equipment. CM Boylan asked about performance metrics to measure the project's success. Lt. Lamb said the goal is to educate the public and encourage safe driving practices, not to reach a goal of a certain amount of tickets or arrests.

CM DeFoor noted that Duval County ranks highest in the state for DUIs, and she asked if JSO has enough staff to address the issue. Lt. Lamb said he works with the staff he has available, but that more staff would be an asset particularly in such a geographically large city.

Daryl Joseph, Parks Director, described the project and the lease agreement. Ms. McNair, LSF, explained the concept of a therapeutic learning center. She described the need for mental health and family wraparound services for children in their program, and the impact of COVID school closures on children. When fully constructed, the center will house eight Head Start classrooms, with accompanying age-appropriate playgrounds, plus a therapy room, a multi-purpose training and meeting room, indoor STEM exploration space and a clinic.

CVP Salem asked about additional City financial obligations. Mr. Joseph said that after construction, the City will be responsible for maintenance and utilities.

CM Boylan asked if the facility will have a playground. Mr. Joseph said there will be two for the learning center, and a separate one in Victory Park.

Phillip Peterson, Auditor's Office, explained the emergency and amendment.

CM Cumber asked why this is an emergency, and about the developer's equity in this project. Steve Kelley, DIA, spoke about how this project renovates an historic building and creates mixed income housing units. He explained that the DPRP Guidelines are waived to permit the Deferred Principal Loan to extend for 16 years, exceeding the normal limit of 10 years because of the need to meet the underwriting requirements of the Florida Housing Finance Corporation for developments utilizing low-income housing tax credits. For this project, the historical former YWCA building on East Duval Street will be renovated and an adjacent new building will be constructed to provide a total of 120 multi-family, mixed-income dwelling units, of which 84 units will be rent restricted to be affordable to persons with incomes of 80% or less of the area median income.

CM Cumber questioned how many low income units are needed downtown, and she asked about a guarantee that the YWCA will be restored and not demolished if issues arise during renovations. Steve Diebenow said that state funds are not tied to renovation of the historic building, but do require a certain number of units overall. CM Cumber asked about the value of the tax abatement for the developer. The emergency passed with a 6-1 vote, CM Cumber in opposition.

CVP Salem proposed a floor amendment that would revise DPRP amounts to \$926,185 for the HPRR Forgivable Loan, \$800,635 for the CCR Forgivable Loan, and \$671,580 for the Deferred Principal Loan. The committee approved the floor amendment, and all of the amendments will be rolled into one.

- Of the 120 total units, 84 units will be affordable with rent limits at 80% or less of AMI (area median income)
- Estimated total development costs of \$39,000,000
- Of the \$39 million, the Historic Improvements component has total development costs of \$7,235,489 and a total construction budget of \$5,449,720

Proposed City Funding

- Total DPRP Loans of \$2,398,400 (Historic Improvements):
- CCR Forgivable Loan \$1,029,100
- HPRR Forgivable Loan \$889,600
- Deferred Principal Loan \$479,700 (Note: waiving the DPRP Guidelines to provide a 16-year payback instead of 10-year payback term)

Previously Approved City Funding

- DIA Affordable Housing Support (AHS) Loan \$625,000 loan with a 20-year term, 1% interest payable semi-annually, and principal due at maturity; funded from the Downtown Northbank CRA
- Jacksonville Housing Finance Authority Gap Loan \$2,500,000 loan with a 20-year term, 1% interest payable semi-annually, and principal due at maturity

HOME and SHIP Loan Subordination

- There is a SHIP (State Housing Initiatives Partnership) Loan of \$134,279.91 and HOME (HOME Investment Partnerships Program) Loan of \$235,200 currently outstanding on the 325 E. Duval Street property
- The terms of the HOME and SHIP Loans as previously approved by Ord. 2019-855-E are being revised to modify the City's lien position to be subordinate to any conventional lender and any governmental lender as approved by the City (i.e. will be in last position after senior financing, JHFA Loan, AHS Loan, and DPRP funding)

Project Timeline

- Commence construction of the Improvements within 6 months of effective date
- Complete construction of the Improvements within 24 months of commencement

Clawbacks

- Withholding of DPRP and AHS Loans if reporting requirements are not met or taxes are not paid
- Funding is subject to repayment if the property is sold within 5 years of disbursement (HPRR and CCR Loans), 16 years of disbursement (Deferred Principal Loan), and 20 years of disbursement (AHS Loan)

ROI

• DIA has calculated ROIs of 0.50 (Historic Improvements) and 7.64 (New Construction Improvements) over a 20-year period, based on a proposed adjustment to the DPRP funding structure that DIA will be recommending. The ROI calculation does not include the \$2,500,000 loan from the Jacksonville Housing Finance Authority.
