Chiquita Moore, Neighborhoods Director, explained the bill which is an annual appropriation from the Litter Trust Fund revenue wherein 70% is appropriated to JTA to maintain bus shelters and bus stops and the other 30% is allocated to the Municipal Code Compliance Division to pay for part-time code enforcement officers and public awareness and education programs.

CM Ferraro asked about the educational component and about the sources of sign complaints. Ms. Moore said that there are JTA awareness programs not under her purview, and also some provided by the City that occur at CPAC meetings. She also mentioned training provided to political candidates regarding campaign signage. Regarding enforcement, she said that most complaints come from citizen reports.

CM Clark-Murray asked about replacing missing trash receptacles at bus stops. Phillip Peterson, Auditor's Office, said that the scope of JTA's project funded through this bill includes the replacement of trash cans.

Phillip Peterson, Auditor's Office, explained the amendment.

Lori Boyer, DIA, summarized the bill which includes a 40 year ground lease with MOSH for a new facility on 2.5 acres on the Northbank at a rate of \$1 per year; a cost disbursement agreement for the design of the area surrounding the new facility; and a joint use agreement for MOSH's priority use of the frontage for events and summer camps etc. The development agreement requires that MOSH's minimum capital investment be \$85 million, of which no less than \$40 million will be non-City funds. The performance schedule obligates MOSH to complete the building by December 31, 2027 and to return the current MOSH site on the Southbank to the City after the current museum building is vacated. The City has already obligated \$20 million in CIP funds to park and riverwalk improvements, and the extension of A. Phillip Randolph.

CVP Salem asked about private donations and the current rate of fundraising. Mr. Fafard, MOSH CEO, said that they have raised \$16 million to date and that they have recently increased their development staff. He noted that having the land acquisition per this bill will be an asset in raising funds and applying for state/federal grants.

CM Cumber asked about what will happen if MOSH doesn't meet its goal, and about the value of the land. Ms. Boyer said that the land is valued at roughly \$7.8 million, and that if the fundraising goal is not met by December 31, 2023 the lease does not go into effect. CM Cumber asked about the unsigned parking agreement with the Jaguars. Ms. Boyer said that the agreement has been authorized but not yet documented. Mr. Hughes said that there is a separate arrangement in the works involving the fairgrounds that will provide the needed stadium parking.

Ms. Boyer spoke about what could be perceived as a modest ROI of .35, since the land does not (and will continue to not) provide property tax revenue since it is owned by the City. She noted the potential ripple effect from development in that area. CM Boylan commented on the significant intangible factors and tourism benefits impacting the ROI of the project.

CM Ferraro asked about land contamination and liability. Ms. Boyer said the land is a brownfield site and that if the required handling of contaminated soil increases construction costs it will be MOSH's responsibility. However, if some new contamination is discovered during construction the City will be liable for cleanup.

CM Clark-Murray asked about the funding source after the fundraising milestone of \$40 million is achieved.

CM DeFoor said that the new MOSH facility is a legacy project for the Administration and council, and she suggested that the Mayor's Office amend the deal to offer a City match to the privately raised funds. CM Cumber asked why this deal is piecemeal, instead of requesting an appropriation of all of the funds needed for the new facility. Mr. Hughes said the next obligation of City funds will be at the discretion of the new Administration. Mr. Fafard said that it is not known at this point how much more they will need for the project, until after the fundraising deadline and based on the award of any grants for which they may apply.

CM DeFoor commented on how this project is good for the city.

Phillip Peterson, Auditor's Office, explained the amendment.

CVP Salem gave a brief overview of the MHOP program, which is a jail diversion program for misdemeanor offenders with mental health issues, intended to break the cycle of repeated misdemeanor arrests and provide them the wrap-around support they need to successfully treat their illness and reintegrate back into the community. He noted that MHOP started as a pilot program with funds allocated by the Social Justice and Community Investment Committee, and said that the program is voluntary and available to only non-violent offenders.

Dr. Bell, Sulzbacher, and David Kilcrease, Mental Health Court Coordinator, spoke about the capacity of the program and completion requirements. Dr. Bell said that graduates must have three essential components for program completion - stabilized medications, secure housing and a source of income (usually SSI benefits). Mr. Kilcrease said there are currently 41 participants and 11 past graduates.

CM Boylan asked about overall City contributions to MHOP. Mr. Peterson said that since the program began the City has provided \$1.25 million to Sulzbacher, \$90,000 to the Public Defender's Office, \$90,000 to the State Attorney's Office and \$200,000 to the Courts for MHOP services.

CMs Boylan and DeFoor asked to be added as co-sponsors.

Phillip Peterson, Auditor's Office, explained the amendment and the nature of the emergency request. Brian Hughes, Mayor's Office, said that construction of the new medical examiners' facility is ready to commence and that the new building will be built with a focus on longevity.

CVP Salem commented on the need for the new facility, and he questioned the sizeable cost increase as compared to the original project estimate.

Robert Pietak, Chief Medical Examiner, was in attendance to speak on behalf of the bill. He talked about the current facility, which is outdated and lacks capacity to handle the ME case load. He said that when he started in the position, the office handled roughly 1500 autopsies per year. Now they handle 2000 per year. He said that the new facility will increase the autopsy stations from 4 to 12 enabling them to hire more staff, and it will be equipped with the latest in x-ray scanning technology.

CM Boylan asked about the cases from other counties. Dr. Pietak said that 78-80% of their cases come from Duval County, with the remainder coming from Nassau, Clay, Columbia and Hamilton Counties which reimburse the office for services rendered.

Mr. Hughes said that the new facility will assist with accreditation and provide a place of dignity for families that go there when they lose a loved one.

CM Clark-Murray asked about the financing. Mr. Greive, CFO, said that the financing would come from either bond issuance or long term debt depending on the interest rates. CM Clark- Murray asked if the new facility will meet the needs of the Medical Examiner. Dr. Pietak said that it will.

Council Auditor's Office Summary Bill 2023-184 – MOSH

Summary:

• Authorizing a redevelopment agreement (RDA) between the City and the Museum of Science and History of Jacksonville (MOSH) to facilitate the construction of a new "iconic" and integrated museum to be located on City owned property within the Shipyards area

MOSH Contribution:

- Construction of new "iconic" museum, requiring:
 - Minimum capital investment of \$85,000,000
 - Minimum enclosed space of 75,000 square feet
 - Minimum exhibit and gallery space of 50,000 square feet
- Maintenance of 1.5 acres joint-use park (excluding capital maintenance)
- Design surrounding park (reimbursable up to \$880,000 by City)

City Contribution:

- 40 year, 2.5 acre ground lease (unimproved land) at a rate of \$1 per year
 - One extension option of 10 years
- Non-exclusive use of 1.5 acres of adjacent park area
- Related future City Construction (current appropriation available of \$19.8 million)
 - Road and Utility Infrastructure (extending A. Philip Randolph to the project site)
 - Riverwalk Improvements
 - Park Improvements

Performance Schedule:

- Executed Park Design agreement within 6 months of RDA effective date
- Satisfy Museum Ground Lease prerequisites, including Funding Milestone (\$40,000,000), execute Museum Ground Lease, and commence Museum Improvements by 12/31/23
- Complete Park Design by 9/30/24
- Complete Museum Improvements by 12/31/27
- DIA CEO may extend the performance schedule by 6 months and an additional 6 month extension is allowed with DIA Board approval

COMMENTS:

- There are no specifically stated penalties in the Redevelopment Agreement, besides general default, to address a failure by MOSH to meet the minimum development requirements
- While MOSH is prohibited from utilizing City funding to meet the requirements of the Funding Milestone (\$40 million), there are no similar prohibitions related to reaching the full \$85 million minimum capital investment
- •The Jaguars must agree to reduce or accept alternate parking as part of their lease with the City prior to closing on the Museum Parcel

ROI - DIA has calculated a 20-year ROI of 0.35
