- DPRP funding will be used to renovate and rehabilitate the building located at 525 W. Beaver Street into a minimum of 12 residential units/7,300 sq. ft. of leasable residential space (which the Developer intends to use as short term housing) and a minimum of 1,300 square feet of leasable commercial/retail space for tenants

AUDITOR RECOMMENDED AMENDMENT

Include clawback provision requiring the project parcel to be used for uses generating Convention/Tourist Development Tax for the five-year period immediately following disbursement of the DPRP Loans (this is the basis used to achieve an ROI greater than 0.50, which is the minimum required under the DPRP Guidelines)

Phillip Peterson, Auditor's Office, explained the Auditor's recommended amendment and it was approved by the committee by voice vote.

Steve Kelley, DIA, spoke on behalf of this bill which authorizes an economic development agreement between DIA and 525 Beaver LLC. to support the renovation and rehabilitation of the former Hillman-Pratt and Walton Funeral Home on West Beaver Street. Dr. Kelley said that the total project cost is roughly \$5 million and includes 12 apartment units to be used for short term rentals, and a coffee/wine bar space. CM Boylan asked about the price per unit. Dr. Kelley said that it matches the unit rate for other DIA historic preservation projects. Dr. Kelley also said that because the rentals are short term, the bed tax adds to the project ROI.

CVP Salem asked about the location of the building and if it will attract renters. Dr. Kelley said the developer has similar short term rental properties in Springfield.

Cherry Pollock, OGC, explained the bill which provides regulations for the numbering of accessory dwelling units and basement units, and for the naming and addressing of various types of roads and access ways. CM Ferraro asked about signage. Ms. Pollock said that the City is responsible for signage on City right-of-ways, and on private roads the homeowners are responsible for signage. CM Ferraro expressed concerns that the 15 day street naming voting period is too short, and about the property owners being aware of this process. CM Ferraro offered a floor amendment to increase the voting period to 45 days and require a public meeting between the property owners and the 911 Emergency Addressing and Advisory Committee prior to a vote on the street renaming. CVP Salem amended the Ferraro floor amendment to include language to involve the district council member in an advance meeting with property owners.

Phillip Peterson, Auditor's Office, explained the amendment.

CVP Salem asked why the interest earnings are not recaptured in the budget process. Lori Boyer, DIA, said that the Downtown Economic Development Fund is a discrete all years fund, similar to funds for capital projects. Joey Grieve, CFO, said that some City funds retain interest earnings, like the Opioid Trust Fund.

Ms. Boyer described the usage of the appropriation, which is to supplement Parks Department capacity by funding enhanced maintenance and programming in downtown destination parks.

CM Ferraro asked if the funds are being used to remodel James Weldon Johnson Park, and if they were used to remove the confederate pedestal marker.

Brian Hughes, Mayor's Office, first said that funding for the JWJ remodel came from CIP funds as directed by the Special Committee of Parks. He then corrected his statement to say that he was thinking of a different project and the JWJ remodel is funded through a state grant.

CM Ferraro asked who authorized the pedestal removal and why it occurred on a Sunday. Mr. Hughes said the Administration authorized the removal, as the fountains are a part of the park remodel, and that it occurred on a Sunday because that date worked for the contractor and downtown is less busy on weekends. Mr. Hughes said the pedestal and the statue are in storage with Public Works, awaiting state approval to convey both to the Hemming family.

There was some discussion about Resolution 2020-0596-A, which expressed council support to return of the Statue of the Confederate soldier and the associated plaque previously displayed in Hemming Park (now James Weldon Johnson Park) to the Hemming family as they requested.

Wendy Khan, OED, summarized the bill which authorizes the execution of a fourth amendment to the lease agreement between the City and Cecil Field POW/MIA Memorial, Inc. to extend the term of the lease agreement to March 31, 2043 and to extend the construction commencement deadline to June 30, 2029.

CM Boylan asked if the construction delay has impacted fundraising from private donors. Ed Turner, National POW/MIA Memorial - Board of Directors, said the total project cost will be roughly \$80 million, and that the fundraising stands at \$1.8 million to date. Mr. Turner indicated that this lease extension will aid in fundraising efforts.
