Update on Ord. 2022-574-E (Pedestrian & Vehicle Safety bill)

Chris LeDew, Chief of Traffic Engineering, discussed the progress of Ordinance 2022-0574-E. This ordinance mandates the traffic engineering office to provide a list of safety measures for solicitors in roadways, including reflective vests, warning signs, traffic plans, and safety instructions. The aim is to keep materials as affordable as possible.

Solicitation is limited to charitable causes, and permits will be issued to non-profit organizations and individual applicants. The permits specify certain roadways, allowing solicitation within 440 feet of a collector or arterial road and four feet from the curbs or pavement. Permits have time limits, with a maximum of two permits issued per applicant per year, and solicitation cannot exceed 36 hours in a 72-hour period.

Provisions have been made to assist indigent applicants. These include providing safety vests and small traffic warning signs and waiving the insurance requirement. Instead of the insurance requirement, these applicants must sign a 'hold harmless agreement' to protect the city from liability. Measures are in place to ensure no one under 18 years old is soliciting, and a traffic safety plan is required.

The permit process is now handled by the Public Works Department in the Traffic Engineering Division. Both paper and electronic applications are available, and Public Works staff can assist applicants in person. Permits and safety materials are available either online or in person.

Enforcement of these regulations falls to the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office (JSO). The application process includes notifying all substations about permit applications. The process came into effect on May 15th,

Jacksonville Sheriff's Office Chief Robert Ellis Burns said that the process has been active for less than a month, as there is no significant data to present yet.

Chief Burns emphasized that the Sheriff's Office is instructed to handle any violations related to the new process consistently across the city. He highlighted citywide efforts to reduce pedestrian safety violations and traffic-related pedestrian injuries, particularly in high-risk locations. Officers are currently deployed to these areas to educate and enforce the new rules on individuals soliciting illegally on roadways.

Chief Burns shared his experience of encountering solicitors in a known hotspot and confirmed that no one had applied for a permit, meaning all solicitors encountered since May 15 are in violation of the ordinance. Officers are currently educating violators, documenting instances, and moving towards arrests if the violations continue. While no arrests have been made specifically for violation of the ordinance, there have been instances of arrests for resistance and failure to comply with lawful commands.

CM Boylan asked about verifying the 501(c)(3) status of non-profit organizations to prevent fraudulent claims. Mr. LeDew acknowledged the importance of verification but was uncertain about the exact process. Mary Staffopoulos from the Office of General Counsel relayed that the State of Florida Secretary of State, Division of Corporations website is an easy tool to confirm that an entity is registered with the state as a not-for profit.

CM Salem asked Mr. LeDew about the permit time limits and the requirement for solicitation signs at solicitation sites. Mr. LeDew clarified that permits cover 36 hours within three consecutive days and confirmed that signs should be present during solicitation. The number of signs depends on the number of solicitors and the road's width.

CM Salem also asked Chief Burns about the process of documenting solicitors' violations and potential arrests.

CM Ferraro expressed concerns about intersection safety and managing groups of solicitors. He questioned the protocol when children accompany solicitors. Chief Burns explained that if a group appears to be soliciting collectively, each individual could be warned or arrested.

Chairwoman DeFoor asked whether citizen reports of violations were permissible or whether law enforcement must witness the violation directly. Chief Burns explained that while citizen reports are valuable, law enforcement needs to witness the violation to take action.

Revises Ordinance Code Sec. 37.103 to:

- Distinguish between "Interim" and "Acting" positions
- Allow Interim employees to serve in an interim capacity for up to 90 days
- Allow Interim and Acting employees to be compensated at a higher rate while serving in the Interim or Acting role (subject to the pay range limit of the position being filled)
- Allow an employee to be designated in the Interim role even if they do not possess residency, experience or other qualifications necessary for the permanent official

Gaby Young, Office of General Counsel, explained the bill.

CM Tyrona Clark Murray asked for clarifications and confirmed that the acting person would receive compensation even if they're not formally appointed to the position. Ms. Young confirmed this, adding that it would be the sheriff's choice, and they would do the job that the position requires and be compensated as such.

CM Al Ferraro asked what happens if no appointment is made within the 90-day period. Chief Kevin Goff, Chief of Human Resources for JSO, explained that there is usually a succession plan in place, and he has not encountered a situation where it has exceeded 90 days. However, if it does, the acting appointee could be removed from the position.

Chairwoman Randy DeFoor asked about the reason for the new legislation, to which Ms. Young explained that retroactive pay can't be provided under state statute, and the legislation would allow an interim to be paid the same amount as if they were permanent. On the matter of residency, Chief Goff clarified that if a permanent appointee did not meet the residency requirement, a waiver could be sought at the time of their appointment legislation.

CM Ron Salem inquired if other positions within JSO besides Sheriff had residency requirements, to which Chief Goff replied no. Ms. Young clarified that the acting appointee needs to fulfill all qualifications for the appointed position, while the interim does not for a period of 90 days.

Chiquita Moore, Director of Neighborhoods Department explained that the bill would appropriate \$5,500 from the Fight Blight campaign to the Neighborhood Services Office's special activity fund. This adjustment is necessary due to an oversight six years ago when the Schedule A did not include the neighborhood awards program and the CPAC anniversary. She highlighted that the Ordinance Code necessitates the neighborhood awards program, and community interest in it is growing. The CPAC anniversary, held every five years, usually sees over 120 attendees. The requested \$5,500 will be used to provide food and refreshments for the combined events this year.

CM Ron Salem and CM Tyrona Clark Murray both expressed their support for the Citizen Planning Advisory Committees (CPACs) during their 30th anniversary. Both CMs praised the CPACs for their crucial role in fostering community activism in Jacksonville.

Phillip Peterson explained the amendment. The amendment passed unanimously. CM Al Ferraro asked Renee Hunter from the Public Works Department about the locations targeted for affordable housing. Hunter explained that these areas were generally ones where properties had tax reverted to the city, usually in council districts 7, 9, and 10. CM Ferraro inquired whether this might change in the future, to which Hunter responded that she anticipated the same districts to continue being the focus for affordable housing.

CM Boylan addressed the implementation of the Live Local Act and asked how the creation of a property list was advancing opportunities for affordable housing development. Ms. Hunter clarified the process, including the role of the Jacksonville Community Land Trust, and the fact that the properties listed had been circulated and found to be of no interest to the trust.

Chairwoman Randy DeFoor confirmed that the Community Land Trust does get first priority to review these properties. Chiquita Moore from the Neighborhoods Department then clarified that the property list was not initially shared with developers but was available to them, non-profit organizations, and the public after it had been reviewed by the city and the Community Land Trust.

Phillip Peterson explained the substitute.

CM Matt Carlucci discussed the bill known by the acronym REHAB, standing for 'Restore Endangered Historic Adaptable Buildings'. This initiative was inspired by the creation of the downtown historic trust which catered exclusively to buildings within the downtown boundaries. Mr. Carlucci acknowledged the absence of incentives for those wishing to preserve and adapt historic buildings located outside the downtown area. This bill aims to extend these benefits to buildings throughout the county beyond downtown.

CM Carlucci expressed his gratitude to various groups for their assistance in developing this initiative. He acknowledged that the creation of such a plan can be a dynamic process, necessitating a substitute bill to avoid an array of amendments. He expressed his willingness to discuss the initiative further with anyone interested and is considering presenting it at the next committee meeting.

CM Carlucci expressed his enthusiasm about the bill, recalling how the demolition of the Ford plant inspired him to devise measures that could help save historic buildings. He believes that with the new initiative, they have created an excellent tool to prevent further loss of historic structures.

CM Ron Salem asked Brian Hughes, Mayor's Office, whether the council's strategic plan would be included in the proposed budget to understand if it was necessary for the Council to ensure its inclusion whether coordination should be with the current or the incoming administration.

Mr. Hughes explained that their budgeting process, set to begin in earnest through the MBRC departmental reviews, aims to replicate this fiscal year's budget with adjustments for inflationary impacts and mandatory salary or benefit increases. He clarified that any new items would be highlighted, including those in alignment with the council's priorities and accounted for in the budgeting process. If a priority item was carried over from previous planning and already accounted for within a budget line, it would likely continue in that line. Mr. Hughes said that he would be working with the mayor-elect, and that Mike Weinstein, former State Senator Audrey Gibson, and former Council President Anna Broche would be part of a transition Advisory Committee on budgeting. They will be attending all departmental MBRC meetings. CM Salem asked if he could attend the MBRC meetings; Mr. Hughes confirmed and offered to send the dates and times of the departmental reviews to the entire council. CM DeFoor asked to be added as a co-sponsor to the bill.

Public Comment

Melissa Casen from Rebel Recovery Jax took the opportunity during the public comment period to reintroduce their organization to the community. She mentioned that their new location is in the 32210-zip code, an area with the highest overdose rates. Ms. Casen expressed a desire to reintroduce a harm reduction initiative that they had proposed two years ago and sought approval from the City Council to establish a legal syringe exchange program in Duval County. She noted that a similar program exists in West Palm Beach under the same organization and expressed ambition to replicate its success in Duval. In the meantime, they offer recovery support services, distribute Narcan (a medication used to reverse opioid overdoses), and provide training and outreach to the community.

CM Salem asked about the organization's funding. Ms. Casen responded by saying that they received a startup grant from Lutheran Services to establish the building and services. They will have a grand opening in mid-July but will begin providing services on July 1. CM Boylan noted that a previous challenge for the Safe Range program was a lack of support from the District Attorney's office. Ms. Casen further elaborated on their services, explaining that they offer peer support for individuals, meeting them where they are in their recovery journey.

John Nooney said would be making another donation to the Artificial Reef Trust Fund. Mr. Nooney expressed disappointment that Ordinance 2023-0351 was not referred to the Waterways Commission. Mr. Nooney also expressed his belief that Jacksonville would benefit from the involvement of a billionaire to support the tourism industry.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:43 a.m.
