Presentation by Jason Teal - Review of Redistricting Experience

MaryMargaret Giannini, OGC, provided a redistricting "lessons learned" wrap-up. Ms. Giannini said that the overall takeaways from the process are: there is no perfect formula, it is important to study history and analyze the present (who is voting and how), and vocabulary matters and may be interpreted differently in a courtroom than in a meeting or casual conversation. She mentioned the 14th Amendment and the Voting Rights Act, and how they address using or not using race as a factor for maps. Ms. Giannini suggested that in future redistricting an expert should work in tandem with the Planning Department. She talked about political gerrymandering, which is permissible, and drawing districts to protect incumbents, it is tenuously permissible to not draw someone out of their seat but not design maps to ensure an incumbent's victory.

CM Priestly Jackson spoke about Allen v. Milligan, recently decided by the Supreme Court related to redistricting in Alabama under the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

CM Becton reviewed the history of this bill (and the companion bills 2023-323 and 2023-324), the 2017 lawsuit Public Trust Environmental Legal Institute of Florida, Inc. and three residents filed against the City, and the punitive nature of the tree regulation enforcement in the existing settlement agreement. This bill amends the settlement agreement to address unanticipated situations that have arisen, and CM Becton said all parties are in support of the amendment.

The Planning Commission recommended denial of this legislation at their 6/8/23 meeting.

There was a lengthy discussion regarding this bill, which amends a duty of the Planning Commission so that alcohol-related zoning exceptions fall under the purview of the City Council instead.

CP Freeman explained the purpose of the bill and how the change would help district council members to respond to the wishes of their constituents. He said there are roughly 3 instances of these exceptions annually. He also noted that no members of the Planning Commission live in the neighborhood where there was recently community opposition to a liquor store proximal to a school. CM Becton said that alcohol-related zoning exceptions are based on set criteria. CP Freeman said the liquor store did not meet 4 of the 9 criteria in his opinion.

CM Clark-Murray shared her strong support for this bill.

CM Priestly Jackson noted that the Planning Commission membership used to require residency in each of the school board districts.

CM Carlucci spoke in support and said that this bill reverts the process back as it once was before it was changed several years ago.

CM Ferraro shared his support, but also his concerns that removing the Planning Commission limits opportunities for the public to be engaged or aware of alcohol-related zoning exceptions in their neighborhoods.

CM Boylan offered a floor amendment to have both the Planning Commission and council approve alcohol-related zoning exceptions. The amendment failed with a hand vote 3-4 (CMs Boylan, Ferraro and Becton in the affirmative; CP Freeman, CMs Priestly Jackson, Newby and Howland in opposition).

CM Newby asked to be added as a co-sponsor.

Trista Carraher, Auditor's Office, explained the amendment.

Gaby Young, OGC, spoke on behalf of this bill which excludes JSO from a requirement to request an exception when purchasing large vehicles. SUVs have become the standard patrol vehicle for the City, so the relevant portion of the *Ordinance Code* is outdated.

Director Schmitt, JSO, explained that police sedans have been phased out with the exception of Chrysler sedans but the City's mechanics lack certification to maintain or repair Chrysler vehicles.

Ford Explorer is the only choice for JSO patrol vehicles and has been for roughly 8 years.

Ms. Young said that Chief Powers would also like to be added to the bill so some specialty JFRD vehicles may be included. Chief Powers confirmed.

The addition of JRFD vehicles will be rolled into the original amendment.

Trista Carraher, Auditor's Office, explained the amendment.

CM Morgan spoke on behalf of the bill, which authorizes an ad valorem tax exemption for portions of multifamily projects containing 50 or more units, up to 75 percent of taxable value if less than 100 percent of the multifamily project is used to provide affordable housing and up to 100 percent of taxable value if 100 percent of the multifamily project is used to provide affordable housing.

CM Ferraro asked how much tax revenue will be lost for the City.

Keith Hicks, Property Appraiser's Office, said that amount is undetermined as of now.

Ms. Carraher concurred, since it is unknown at this point how many housing projects will utilize the exemption.

Mr. Hicks explained that there is an annual review, with a renewal after three years. • Amends Code Sec. 111.555 (Florida Theatre Maintenance Trust Fund) to limit the use of funds to capital improvements only

• Approves an Amended and Restated Lease Agreement with the Florida Theatre Performing Arts Center, Inc. for the Florida Theatre building (including Offices and Theatre)

- Term, rent, and maintenance obligations remain unchanged

- Adds floors 4-7 to the leased premises

- Allows the tenant to negotiate on behalf of the City license agreements for the office portion of the building

- Updates legal language from the 1985 lease

• A one cycle emergency has been requested in order to allow continuity of lease terms and clarify maintenance obligations in light of ongoing and upcoming capital improvements at the Florida Theatre

Trista Carraher, Auditor's Office, explained the emergency.

Brian Hughes, Mayor's Office, explained the bill which authorizes execution of an amended and restated lease between the City and Florida Theatre Performing Arts Center Inc. for the Florida Theatre. The bill adds office building floors to the lease, and makes the term and extension options of the office building match the term and extension options for the theater portion of the building.
