Presentation by Daryl Joseph - Bill 2023-348

Daryl Joseph, Director of the Parks and Recreation Department gave a presentation on 2023-0348, which allocates \$50,000,000 from the Parks and Quality of Life Special Committee. He provided an overview of the existing amenities, new projects, and ongoing projects that require additional funding for completion. Mr. Joseph also outlined a \$100,000 budget allocated to each Council District for use on a parks project of their choosing.

CM Cumber inquired about the timeline for repairing the 38 playgrounds currently in poor condition. Mr. Joseph indicated that the estimated completion time ranges from six months to a year. When CM Cumber asked for an update on the ship delivery for Friendship Fountain, Mr. Joseph responded that their immediate focus is on rectifying the playground situation, which should be resolved by the summer of the following year.

CM Boylan recommended that the Parks and Recreation Department publish a timeline of the projects. In response to a question from CM Carlucci about the availability of contingency funds to ensure project completion, Mr. Joseph assured that a certain degree of contingency was factored into the financial estimates. Furthermore, he viewed the \$100,000 assigned to each Council District as an additional form of contingency.

• Establishes the Restore Endangered Historic Adaptable Buildings (REHAB) Special Revenue Fund to foster the repair, rehabilitation, and restoration of non-residential income producing, mixed-use historic buildings, or historic buildings owned by not-for-profits

• Limits grant funding to \$100,000 based on guidelines modeled after the DIA's Downtown Preservation and Revitalization Program paid out on a project completion basis when funds are available

• Projects must meet six specific criteria:

- Located outside Downtown area
- Building must be at least 50 years old
- Building must be non-residential income producing, mixed-use, or owned by a not-for-profit
- Building must be architecturally or historically significant

- Building must be a local landmark, a contributing structure to a historic district, or declared a potential local landmark (final landmark status required prior to approval of grant)

- Building must be declared critically endangered by Jacksonville Historic Preservation Commission (JHPC)

The REHAB Program will be administered by the Historic Preservation Section of the Planning and Development Department and the City's Chief Administrative Officer or designee Has an effective date of 10/1/23 or upon funding of the special revenue fund

CM Salem clarified that the funding for the bill is outlined in the strategic plan. He asked CM Carlucci if they were seeking private funds for the project. CM Carlucci responded that every other historic preservation effort he has been involved in provided for matching funds from individuals. However, he noted, they can't really begin to seek these until the bill is passed. CM Boylan confirmed with the auditors that the guidelines require a 25% match.

CM Cumber raised a question about a prohibition on retroactivity. Philip Peterson and Carla Lopera from the Office of General Counsel confirmed that the legislation specifies that those who have already completed repairs are not eligible for the completion grant. CM Carlucci added that he doesn't want to see individuals who have already done the work come in and obtain funds. He expressed an interest in finding a way to differentiate those who don't need the money from those who do.

CM Salem asked a question about a bank located across from University Park. CM Carlucci replied that the building in question was just added to the list of 25 endangered historic buildings that could be repurposed for other uses. CM Salem confirmed with Ms. Lopera that there isn't a restriction on the internal usage of the buildings, beyond what is dictated by the zoning code and whatever is historically or architecturally valuable on the interior.

CM Carlucci then outlined the idea for the bill and read endorsements from the Durkeeville Historical Society, Riverside Avondale Preservation, San Marco Preservation Society, and SPAR.

Phillip Peterson from the Council Auditor's Office explained the amendment. CM Boylan introduced Chiquita Moore, Chief of the Neighborhoods Department, and emphasized that the grants are not automatically awarded, and the City is consistent in securing them. Chiquita Moore discussed the next five continuation grant bills.

CM Clark-Murray asked if data could be provided regarding how many people these grants have served. Brian Hughes, Chief Administrative Officer, responded that a dashboard will be unveiled in the coming days and that it will be self-reporting.

CM Gaffney Jr. inquired about the utilization of the funds and their impact on the community. Ms. Moore explained that the five different grants they administer all serve different purposes, including affordable housing projects, rental development, homeless initiatives, housing opportunities for individuals with HIV or AIDS, and construction acquisition. Mr. Hughes added that the legislation includes a spreadsheet detailing specific dollar amounts line by line.

CM Boylan requested to be added as a co-sponsor for all five continuation grant bills. CM DeFoor asked about the resolution of heir property issues. Ms. Moore explained the program to Chair DeFoor.

CM Freeman explained the bill, highlighting that according to CDC data, black children are three times more likely to drown than white children, and that 64% of black children do not know how to swim. CM Clark-Murray asked whether the eight-week summer program had already begun, and inquired about the program's cost. CM Freeman clarified that the program is continuous, ensuring that children on the waiting list have the opportunity to participate.

CM Gaffney Jr. shared that he had begun taking swimming lessons two weeks prior following a near-drowning experience. CMs Morgan, Salem, DeFoor, Boylan, and Cumber requested to be added as co-sponsors of the bill.

• The exemption period will begin with the 2024 tax roll and will expire December 31, 2026 unless extended by Council prior to that date. Extensions are effective for a three-year time period.

• The listing of properties eligible for this exemption will be finalized by March 1, 2024 and the financial impact on ad valorem revenue for FY 24/25 is undetermined at this time

Phillip Peterson from the Council Auditor's Office explained the amendment. CM Boylan asked a question about the eligibility requirements for the exemption. Mr. Peterson clarified that the language was taken directly from the state statute for the exemption, and they aimed to encompass as broad a group as possible. The amendment to the bill was passed and CM Morgan proceeded to explain the bill.

Chair DeFoor invited Keith Hicks from the Property Appraiser's Office to speak about the bill. She confirmed that the bill sunsets in December of 2026, but it can be extended for an additional four years. CM Boylan expressed concern that the Council was approaching what should be a multi-faceted problem with a singular solution. He asked how this bill aligns with their comprehensive efforts to address affordable housing in Jacksonville.

Mr. Hicks responded that the Florida Legislature had passed three different bills to allow local communities to address the issue at the local level, two of which have already become law. This bill represents the third initiative. Mary Staffopoulos from the Office of General Counsel added that this bill doesn't restrict anything; it simply provides another tool in the toolbox for addressing the issue. CM Morgan added that the exemption period doesn't begin until 2024.

CM Cumber inquired whether there was an estimate of the tax revenue that might go uncollected due to the bill. Mr. Peterson responded that such data was unavailable, as the number of existing developments that would qualify was unknown. He added that qualifiers must not have received more than three citations for code violations and must be up-to-date on their taxes.

CM Cumber offered an amendment to the bill stipulating that properties currently under the jurisdiction of the public nuisance abatement board would not be eligible. A brief discussion on the validity of the amendment ensued among Mary Staffopoulos, CM Cumber, and Chair DeFoor. CM Cumber proposed an amendment stating that a property cannot be under the jurisdiction of the Nuisance Abatement Board, provided this is allowed by state law. The motion was seconded and approved.

CM Salem made a motion to reconsider the item, which CM Clark-Murray seconded. The Council Auditor's amendment was proposed, seconded, and unanimously approved.

Tiffany Pinkstaff from the Office of General Counsel for the Property Appraiser's Office was able to research the previous amendment proposed by CM Cumber. She explained that while there is no specific preemption language in the statute, only the Florida Legislature can provide for an exemption, and the City cannot add or remove any additional requirements.

Ms. Staffopoulos recommended that the Committee proceed with the bill as amended, including only the Council Auditor's amendment. CM Cumber sought clarification on the OGC opinion. Ms. Staffopoulos replied that it's not the Property Appraiser's Office, but the Neighborhoods Department, who will review applications to confirm they meet the criteria. This will be an internal process. CM Cumber suggested that it would be beneficial for the OGC to work with the Neighborhoods Department to ensure that properties currently under the jurisdiction of the public nuisance abatement board do not qualify for the exemption.

Phillip Peterson from the Council Auditor's Office explained the amendment. CM Salem presented the bill and introduced Chief Keith Powers from Fire Rescue. Chief Powers proceeded to introduce the staff that will administer the Opioid Settlement Proceeds grant program. Chair DeFoor asked a question about how much money was allocated and what portion would be dedicated to prevention. CM Salem responded that approximately \$80,000,000 would be allocated over 18 years, and that the allocation was front-loaded with \$9,000,000 in the first year. He added that the initial distribution would be 34% for prevention, 33% for treatment, and 33% for recovery support, but he hopes that the Board would adjust these percentages as necessary based on observed needs.

Phillip Peterson from the Council Auditors Office explained the emergency and CM Salem described the bill. CM Cumber sought clarification on the two companies mentioned by CM Salem, who replied that he didn't have that information at hand. CM Cumber expressed concern over the possibility of any firm with previous ties to the Jaguars being part of the process and urged for a robust RFP process. Chair DeFoor voiced apprehension about the optics of a direct contract, while CM Salem asked for the Councilmembers to postpone a vote requiring an RFP until the next City Council meeting.

CM Cumber asked where CM Salem sourced the two firms from, to which he replied that he got them from the Mayor's Administration. CM Boylan spoke in favor of the amendment. CM Clark-Murray asked about the usual duration for RFPs, to which Mr. Peterson responded typically 3-4 months. CM Cumber noted that the City Council had previously hired a law firm through a full RFP process in about 30 days. Chair DeFoor inquired who from the administration provided CM Salem with the firms' names. CM Salem said that Mr. Hughes gave him the names and emphasized that he had asked the OGC if he could reach out to people ahead of time, which they confirmed would not be a conflict.

Chair DeFoor requested Mr. Hughes to disclose the two firms. He named CA Icon and a Texas-based firm, adding that the scope for the RFP would be too narrow, with multiple firms qualifying for it. He also expressed confusion about Chair DeFoor's concern regarding it being political, leading to a brief exchange between them regarding what Chair DeFoor meant . CM Salem argued that his aim was to ensure the Council was as prepared as possible for upcoming economic development issues. CM Boylan suggested to CM Salem that he could still propose other options at the next City Council meeting. The amendment was approved unanimously, and Mary Staffopoulos from the Office of General Counsel explained the amendment for the bill.
